#### PREFACE

Mary Matha Arts & Science College, Mananthavady is situated on a beautiful hilltop on the Mananthavady-Mysore Highway amidst the sprawling greenery of the Western Ghats, one of the crucial bio-diversity hot spots. The major reason for selecting this place as the site for the College was to provide a pristine pollution-free environment to the students, conducive to academic activities.

The college symbolizes the realization of the dreams and aspirations of the people of the tribal, minority concentrated and backward hill-district of Wayanad. The College is established in 1995 and is managed by the Roman Catholic Diocese of Mananthavady with the objective of meeting the higher educational needs of the youth of Wayanad. The College is included under Section 2 (F) & 12 (B) of the UGC Act, was awarded Grade B++ (83.5%) by the NAAC in 2006, and is now all set for the NAAC Re-accreditation.

With six Undergraduate Programmes, one Postgraduate Programme, two Research Centres, and an upcoming Study Centre of the IGNOU, the College has maintained its reputation for diversification. In addition to that the College runs three Certificate Courses, and has been contemplating to run two more. There are 608 students on the Rolls of the College, of which 389 are Women, 219 Men, 24 SCs, 27 STs, 145 OBCs, and 3 OECs. The College has been achieving near 100 % results in the University Examinations. Almost all the Associate Professors on our Faculty are Ph D holders with five of them having approval for Research Guidance in various Universities. The Faculty Members have been operating 21 Minor Research Projects and two Major Research Projects during the XI Plan. In addition to that, the UGC sanctioned various Projects amounting to around two Crores.

The Students' Union, NSS, NCC, the Bhoomithrasena Club, Women's Cell, the Central Library with its Book Bank Facility & the Network Resource Centre, the College Canteen, the Mentoring System, the Counseling Cell, the Career Guidance and Placement Cell, and the Scholarship Processing Cell offer Student Welfare Services across the Campus. The College has undertaken quite a few Extension Services like the Maithri Community Development Programme, the Karunya Charity Mission, Employment Training Programme for Tribal Women and Community Radio Service in association with the *Radio Mattoli*.

Systems have been created on the campus for the Student Community to imbibe values of Social Commitment. The Academic Community observes the College Anthem in the morning in order to respect the College and the National Anthem in the evening as a mark of respect to the Country, which offers tremendous individual freedom. The most significant and revolutionary practice on Campus

has been holding the *Students' Union Elections in the Parliamentary Mode* following the Lyngdoh Commission recommendations, braving initial resistance, to ensure violence-free atmosphere on the campus. The *Project on English Newspaper Reading, PEN-R,* launched in 2006, has been proved successful in inculcating reading habit among the entire students of the College. The *Certificate Course in Communicative English,* offered by the Department of English aims at training the students in the use of English for academic and interactional purposes. The system of maintaining *the Work Done Diary of the Faculty, the Diary of the Class Representatives,* Separate Registers for recording the Achievements of both the Faculty and the Students etc. have added special flavor to the flourishing co-and extra-curricular activities on the Campus.

Mary Matha provides an excellent and salubrious environment for the students to get the best in Wayanad with outstanding opportunities to make the most of their intellectual potentials. As a Christian Minority Institution, it endeavours to inculcate in them human values and social commitment as envisaged by Jesus Christ. It considers education not just as a search for knowledge, but as a great mission in which both the teachers and students participate in the process of developing human resources for the benefit of the society and the nation. The College seeks to instill in the students an awareness of their social rootedness and encourage them to be active agents in the construction of a just social order after its stated Motto, Vision, and Mission. Though a minority institution, the College includes in its purview the educational aspirations of the community as a whole, irrespective of religion, caste, and social status.

We are dedicated to achieving the highest possible standards in every area: academic attainment, research through societal interventions, cultural and sporting activities etc. We provide a supportive environment, where students from all backgrounds can make the best of their innate potential. We offer prospective students a chance to mould their future by providing individual attention through the Mentoring System and allowing them to form close working relationships with their teachers.

The College stands conspicuous for State of the Art Logistics provided by the Management, the cooperation extended by the Parents, the dedicated service offered by the Teaching and Administrative Teams, and the vibrant Campus kept by the Student Community, which is a model to behold. Mary Matha Arts and Science College has completed 18 years' service to the youth of Wayanad and neighbouring districts, and we seek the continued blessings of Providence in the years to come. The academic community has been inspired by the Mahatma's words: *A small body of determined spirits, fired by an unquenchable faith in their mission can alter the course of history*.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

- Mary Matha Arts and Science College Mananthavady is an aided College affiliated to the Kannur University and follows the Curriculum designed by the University.
- The College offers Six UG Programmes: Functional English, Mathematics, Zoology, Computer Science, Commerce, and Chemistry; One PG Programme in Mathematics and Two PhD Programmes: Mathematics and Zoology. Two of the above Programmes are run on Self-financing Mode: B. Sc. Chemistry and M. Sc Mathematics.
- In addition to the Regular Programmes, the Institution offers three Certificate Courses (Communicative English, Organic Farming and Herbal Medicine & Primary Healthcare), and has been contemplating to run two more Certificate Courses (Computer Applications, and Yoga & Health Science). The process of setting up the IGNOU Study Centre on the Campus is in the pipeline.
- With the introduction of the Choice Based Credit and Semester System by the University in the academic year 2009-10, students of one Department have the option to choose Open Courses offered by other Departments and have the facility for Credit Transfer. Lateral mobility is limited to Open Courses only.
- Taking the requirements of students in mathematical skills, communicative skills, physical fitness, environmental awareness, culture potentials of economically important animals etc. into consideration, the Institution offers Open Courses in Business Mathematics, Communicative English, Physical Fitness and Training, Environmental Science, Aquaculture, Sericulture and Apiculture respectively.
- The College is keen on providing academic and infrastructural facilities for effective Curriculum Delivery. ICT enabled technologies are made available for enhancing teaching effectiveness. There are 12 Digital Classrooms of which 6 are provided with Smart Boards. Of the two Computer Labs, one with 25 Computers has been set apart for the students of Departments other than Computer Science. 24 hours free Internet Access is provided in all Staff Rooms and in the NRC.

- Both the Students and Faculty are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skill through\_Blended Learning, M-learning, and Expert Lectures etc.
- The Institution invites Personnel from various Industries to deliver Expert Lectures and to interact with the students & teachers.
- The Institution interacts and networks with the University through various Academic Bodies for the effective operationalisation of the Curricula.
- The Institution takes efforts to integrate the Major Cross Cutting Issues like Gender Equality, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. into the Curriculum.
- The Institution has an efficient mechanism to collect feedback from the ongoing and outgoing students, from alumni, parents, educationalists, Academic Societies/Associations and neighbouring communities.

#### **Criterion II: TEACHING LEARNING EVALUATION**

- The Admission Policy of the Institution and its Student Profiles reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.
- The Admission Committee ensures publicity and maintains 100% transparency in the entire admission process. It is also responsible for reviewing the Admission Process and the Student Profile annually.
- Admission to all UG and PG Programmes are based strictly on Merit; there is no Common Entrance Test for admissions. Differently-abled students are given relaxation in the eligibility for admission as per Government Norms; 3% of the total seats are reserved for such students.
- For the Freshers (newly admitted students), the College conducts two days' Orientation Programme to bridge their knowledge gap and to acquaint them with the Campus atmosphere, examination & evaluation processes, extra- and co-curricular activities etc.
- Since majority of our students has done their primary education up to tenth standard in rural schools, their proficiency in the English Language (spoken as well as written) is not up to the required level. Considering this factor as a serious academic matter, the Institution launched a project named *PEN-R (Project on English Newspaper Reading)* to subscribe English newspapers to the classrooms since 2007.

- Sensitization of Staff and Students on various issues related to gender, inclusion, environment, health & hygiene, marginalized communities of the society etc. are carried out in the Institution through various Programmes including extension activities through the various Forums/Clubs/Cells/Bodies and through other methods like posters, banners etc.
- Slow and Advanced Learners are identified through Continuous Evaluation.
- Students at the risk of 'dropping out' are given individual care and attention to retain them in the Institution. In addition to the *Peer-group Learning System*, teachers give special attention and conduct remedial coaching to such students.
- In order to monitor the quality of teaching and learning, the Institution has an Academic Vision Plan, which is realized through the Academic Master Plan and is put in motion through the System of Academic Hierarchy to which individual Faculty members are accountable.
- The IQAC that plays a pivotal role in maintaining the Quality Culture in the College prepares the Academic Master Plan and places it before the College Council for discussion and recommendation for implementation. The IQAC Sets the Quality Benchmarks/Parameters for the various Academic and Administrative Activities of the Institution and Monitors their effective implementation.
- The Institution follows the Student-centric Teaching Learning Process effectively by adopting various teaching methods suited to the learning abilities of students like Blended Learning, M-learning, Expert Lectures etc.
- The Institution has been endeavoring to fine-tune the educational process in the College through the implementation of Innovative Teaching Methods, bringing a wide array of innovative approaches into the academic process like Democratization of the Educational Process, a Fundamental Shift of the Instructor's Role, Co-operative Learning Method etc.
- The College has an effective Mentoring System. Mentors of the College are accessible, responsive, open-minded, student-oriented and dedicated to the development of his/her mentees.

- The Central Library in the Institution plays an important role in augmenting the teaching learning processes. It is fully automated with KOHA Software, and it possesses 12394 Books, Journals, Magazines/Periodicals, News papers, Back Volumes, e-books & CDs, INFLIBNET Services, Book Bank Facility to the financially challenged students etc.
- The Institution provides the services of a Professional Counselor on campus in addition to the Teacher-counselors to address the psycho-social issues of the needy students.
- Of the 26 Permanent Faculty, 14 are Doctorate Degree holders, which includes almost all the Associate Professors. One more faculty member has submitted her thesis and four have been pursuing research leading to PhD.
- During the past 5 years the teaching community attended 67 National Seminars/ Workshops/ Conferences/ Group Discussions etc. and 40 International Seminars/ Workshops/ Conferences/ Group discussions etc. Three Faculty members attended Orientation Courses and 15 attended Refresher Courses.
- With the introduction of CCCS by the University, the Institution has a rigorous and transparent Internal Evaluation System in place. The Assessment/Evaluation Processes, as directed by the University that includes frequent test papers, assignments, Seminars and regularity of attendance, are taken as indicators for Evaluating Student Performance and Achievement of Learning Objectives.
- At the end of every academic year the academic activities of the year are evaluated. Schedules for Teaching, Examination, Conduct of Seminars, Workshops, and other Curricular and Co & Extra Curricular activities are critically evaluated and each department presents before the community their suggestions for improvement and plans for major academic Programmes for the next year.

#### **CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION**

• At present, the Institution has two Research Centres - in Mathematics and Zoology, recognized by Kannur University and five Research Guides of different Universities.

- The Institution has a Research Committee to monitor and address the issues related to research. The Committee motivates the faculty to promote research, coordinate research activities of different Departments and to inculcate a research culture among the academic community.
- The Faculty Members have completed 2 Major Research Projects and 14 Minor Research Projects. Currently there are 7 ongoing Minor Research Projects. Proposals for 3 Major Projects and half a dozen Minor Research Projects have been submitted for funding.
- One International Workshop, an International Seminar, 4 National Seminars, one National Group Discussion, and 2 National Level Expert Review & Monitoring were organized in the Institution during the past five years.
- The Institution inculcates scientific temper among students so as to enable them to discuss and argue over established norms, laws and theories, and feel free to put the views across without fear of being ridiculed or rejected. The institution keeps in mind that students by their very nature seek logic, question all that they observe, and believe in applying their knowledge to practical use.
- Eminent Scientists/Personalities have visited the Institution as a part of the National/International Seminars and Workshops during the past five years.
- The Institution encourages the teachers to actively involve in the popularization of science Programmes being organized within and outside the campus. Many teachers of this institution are Resource Persons in different areas of knowledge.
- The institution encourages its staff to engage in interdisciplinary and interdepartmental research activities and resource sharing. In spite of the limitations of an undergraduate College and with only two Research Centres, the Institution ensures optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the Institution by staff and students.
- For Research promotion, the Institution provides administrative support, academic freedom, uninterrupted power and water supply and 24 hours free Internet connectivity.
- The researchers have freedom to utilize the infrastructure facilities in the campus even on holidays and on off hours.
- The Research Centres have procured minimum essential equipment for scientific research with the financial support from DST, KSCSTE and

UGC under the Supervision of Sr Dr Germina K. A. eight researchers have obtained Ph D degree and Five others are pursuing research leading to PhD in Maths. Dr Joseph K. J. has three researchers in Malayalam. In Zoology, Dr P. K. Prasadan has one research scholar while Dr Sudha Devi has two. Of late three students have applied for Ph D registration in Zoology.

- The Faculty published 72 research papers in National/International Journals, two Books, 11 Articles, and 25 Book Chapters / Conference-Seminar Proceedings.
- Two of the faculty, Dr Germina K A and Dr Sudha Devi A R have received international recognition from reputed professional bodies and have been invited to present papers in Overseas Seminars.
- In order to promote Institute-Industry Interface, the College has constituted an Entrepreneurial Club to conduct Programmes to develop entrepreneurial skills among the students. Institution arranges visits and interactions with industries on a regular basis:
- In this Institution, education is looked upon not just as a search for knowledge but as a great mission in which both the teachers and students participate in the process of developing human resources for the benefit of the society and nation. Therefore, the Institution encourages the faculty members to extend their services in the form of consultancy to the needy free of cost.
- The Institution promotes the participation of students and faculty in extension activities through the functioning of NCC, NSS and different Clubs & Associations. Outreach Programmes organized by the College can be categorized into two: 1. Educational Programmes for the dissemination of knowledge to students of neighbourhood schools and general public by using the human resources available in the College and 2. Social Service Programmes for improving the living conditions of the socially marginalized sections of society and for motivating and inspiring them to improve themselves.
- The Institution forged constructive relationships with the neighbouring Educational Institutions and Non Governmental Agencies to work on various Outreach and Extension Activities.
- Though the institution doesn't have any formal collaboration with other institutions, we make use of the facilities/resources of various forums and institutions for research & extension and vice versa.

#### **CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES**

- The College is situated in an 18 acres Campus with 7500 sq mts of built up area.
- The Institution provides Infrastructure Facilities on priority basis as envisaged in the Infrastructure Master Plan. As per the Feedbacks received, the Infrastructure facilities provided for academic activities are the best in Wayanad.
- By taking the recommendation of the NAAC Peer Team that visited the campus in December 2005, and in consultation with the Board of Governors, the IQAC had prepared the Infrastructure Master Plan and placed it before the Infrastructure Development Committee for discussion and recommendation for implementation.
- The College has 19 spacious Classrooms, of which 12 are ICT enabled. Five Common Staff Rooms with Internet facility and Separate Rooms with Internet connectivity for Heads of Major Departments. Well equipped laboratories are provided for all Science Subjects and Languages.
- The Institution provides WiFi facility in the campus.
- Two Women's Hostels, one partially funded by the UGC and the College Management and with a capacity to accommodate 40 students and another one run by Nuns and recognized by the Institution with a capacity for 50 students is provided on the Campus.
- A hostel for Men is provided in the neighbourhood by the Divine Providence Seminary.
- Safe Drinking Water is provided on all the floors of the college building.
- Medical help is offered on the hospitality of the Government Health Centre, St Joseph's Hospital, St Vincent Hospital, and the District Hospital, Mananthavady.
- Other Facilities that are conspicuous on the Campus are a well furnished IQAC Room (Area 275 sq ft) with state of the art facilities, Women's Cell, Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Well furnished and spacious Canteen, Recreational Spaces, Multipurpose Indoor Sports facility with a Permanent Stage, Sports & Games Facilities, Audio-Visual cum Seminar

Hall, Counseling Centre, Parking Facilities, Student Centre, Adequate Toilet Facilities, Network Resource Centre (NRC), INFLIBNET, Language Laboratory, Primary Health Care Garden, Chapel/Prayer Rooms, Visitors' Room, Guest Rooms, Co-operative Store, Bus Shelters, BSNL Tower etc.

- The Central Library has an Open Access System automated with KOHA Software. NRC in the Library offers INFLIBNET facility. The Book Bank Facility provides costly books to the financially challenged students.
- Each Department is provided with a Netbook Computer and Digital Camera, and unlimited free Internet access to Staff and Students for academic purposes.
- Well equipped Computer Lab for the Students and Faculty of the Department of Computer Science, and an additional Computer Lab for the Students and Faculty of Departments other than Computer Science are made functional by a full time technician.
- The Academic Community keeps the Campus Clean, hygienic and Plastic Free with focus on Bio-diversity Conservation.
- The College offers its facilities to the local community and local institutions on need during idle hours.
- During the XI Plan period, the UGC has sanctioned an assistance of Rs. 1,97,10,000/- under various heads including Rs. 12,00,000/- for the construction of 105x70 Outdoor Stadium and Rs 30,00,000/- for setting up Indoor Training Facility (20x15x7). The Management, of late has provided an Open Air Stage to hold common functions.

#### **CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION**

- The institution ensures its commitment and accountability by providing updated, transparent and accurate information related to the physical and functional aspects of the institution at the right time.
- The information, which the students are expected to know about the college including the Faculty Profile, Rules & Regulations and Admission Procedure are given in an organized and systematic manner the Prospectus & Calendar, published annually.
- The Students' Union publishes the College Magazine, to showcase the talents and creativity of the academic community. Periodical News Letters

are published by the IQAC. In addition to that, some Departments bring out Department Magazines (printed and/or manuscript-magazine) occasionally.

- The Institution provides financial assistance to students through various Scholarships in addition to the UGC, State and Central Government aids.
- Specific Support Services/facilities are available to students from SC/ST, OBC, and Financially Challenged Sections of society, and students with Physical Disabilities.
- An Entrepreneurship Club has been functioning in the college, which conducts Programmes to develop entrepreneurial skills among the students. The B Com degree Programme offered in the College has a paper on Entrepreneurship. Many a Programme offered in the College also promote Entrepreneurial Skills.
- The Policy of the Institution is to promote co- and extra-curricular activities to supplement the curricular activities. Accordingly, the College organizes various Programmes such as sports, games, quiz competitions, debate & discussions, cultural activities etc. regularly. Separate Portfolios are allocated in the College Students' Union to ensure student participation in all areas of student activities.
- 65 former students of the College have qualified SET, 11 UGC NET, and four GATE exams.
- The Institution provides Academic Counseling, mainly through the Mentoring System. Mentors of this institution are good listeners, able to offer honest and constructive criticism and willing to compliment the pupils' accomplishments. The service of a Professional Counselor is made available on campus in addition to the teacher-Counselors to address the psycho social issues of the needy students.
- The College has a Career Guidance and Placement Cell. Thirty Six students have already been selected for placements through campus selection.
- The institution has a Student Grievance Redresser Cell and a Committee for the Prevention of Harassment of Women.

• The Drop-out Rate is generally low (>5% including students who leave the college to join professional courses). The institution takes extra care to minimize the dropout rate

#### **CRITERION V: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT**

- The College has a time tested and efficient Organizational Structure to plan, design and implement the policies of the Institution.
- The Academic and Administrative Hierarchical System function as well oiled machine to implement the decisions made at different levels.
- IQAC in the College functions as a nodal agency to ensure the formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan. The Master Plan designed by IQAC in consultation with the Board of Governors considered three major aspects for inclusion Academic Growth, Infrastructure Development and Promotion of Research & Extension Activities.
- Operational Autonomy, Academic Democracy and Decentralized Governance System promote quality culture in every activity on the campus.
- A Democratic system of electing the College Students' Union following the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendations prevails in the College since 2007, and it ensures peaceful teaching-learning on the Campus.
- The Institution grooms Leadership at various levels and Leadership of Faculty Members is entrusted in the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the College.
- The Leadership of the Institution ensures the interaction with the various Stakeholders.
- The Institution has multiple ways of handling complaints and grievances based on their nature.
- The Feedback Mechanism has been found effective in revitalizing the policies of the Institution.
- The Financial Resources of the Institution are mainly funds from the University Grants Commission, Govt of Kerala and the College Management. During the XI Plan Period, UGC has sanctioned Rs. 1, 97, 10, 000 (Rupees One Crore, Ninety Seven Lakhs and Ten Thousand Only) as assistance under various schemes.

#### **CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES**

- The Inter-religious Prayer Meet on the Academic Excellence Day, Celebrating Religious Festivals, Two Days' Orientation for Freshers, Mentoring System, Bridge Course, Remedial Coaching, Blended Learning, Peer Group Learning (Learning from and with each other), Interactive Learning, Book Banking, Expansion of Research Promotion, Maintenance of NRC, further Strengthening of the Career & Placement Cell, Grooming Leadership at various levels are the *major innovations* of the College.
- The College has a Green Campus. Biodiversity Conservation is given utmost priority and the Campus is declared "*Plastic Free and Eco-friendly*."
- The Green Audit or the Environmental Sustainability Baseline Assessment is conducted annually. The message of Energy Conservation is disseminated through awareness campaign, documentary screening and organizing seminars/workshops on environmental issues.
- The Rainwater Harvesting Unit has been installed in the newly constructed buildings. The Institution constructed a Pond and a number of Trenches to recharge groundwater and to meet the diverse water demands of the Institution.
- The Hazardous Wastes generated in the Science Labs of the College are negligible. The organic waste materials generated in the College are efficiently being converted into bio-gas, and thereby a strong message on the Significance of Renewable Energy is disseminated among the students.

#### **Best Practices:**

- Implementation of the Parliamentary Mode of Students' Union Election ensures peaceful teaching-learning environment on the campus. A democratic system of electing the Students' Union, following the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendations has been prevailing in the College since 2007. This is the only College affiliated to Kannur University, and one among the few Colleges in the State of Kerala to have shifted to the Parliamentary Mode of Election successfully.
- The '**PEN-R'** *Project on English Newspaper Reading* is a Language Proficiency Development Programme to inculcate reading habit among the students.



#### 1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

#### 1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the Institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

#### The Motto: Education for Total Liberation

**Vision:** Holistic development of our students with sound intellectual, physical, psychological, emotional and spiritual maturity that will pave the way for a truly democratic, secular and equitable society.

**Mission and Objectives:** To make knowledge available to the students through quality education irrespective of their religion, caste or sex, but keeping in view the educational needs of the Christian Community as well, thus to be an active agent contributing to the socio-economic and cultural transformation of Wayanad.

The Vision and Objectives are stated in the Memorandum of Association of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Mananthavady, registered under the Societies Registration Act (Act XXI) of 1861-S.No.277/2000 and in the College Calendar.

Education is looked upon not just as a search for knowledge, but as a great mission in which both the teachers and students participate in the process of developing human resources for the benefit of the society and nation. Though educational and social uplift of the minority community is an important objective, the Institution accommodates the interests of all the educationally disadvantaged and marginalized sections of the society, especially tribal students and girl-students. The College, situated in a tribal area, takes care to motivate and provide opportunities and facilities to tribal students aspiring for higher studies. Since 75% of our students are girls, the College makes it a mission to empower girls into globally competent, socially committed and morally upright citizens, who can contribute to the development and wellbeing of the nation.

Since higher education has now become an international service, the Institution also aims at facilitating the development of global competency in our students, encompassing the following Goals and Objectives:

- To act as a centre for "Information, Formation and Transformation" by providing value-based and technologically aided educational facilities to everyone without any discrimination of creed, caste and gender.
- To impart quality education among the students, who pass through the portals of this Institution to equip them to gain admission to prestigious Institutions and to take up challenging jobs.
- To inculcate a strong value system in the students through social service, value education and extension activities, and help the students assimilate basic human values like love, honesty, tolerance, empathy, integrity, truthfulness etc.
- To attract students from the marginalized sections of the society, especially the scheduled caste/tribal population, to higher education and thus empower them to play a positive role in the society.
- To create a culture of eco-spirituality that makes the students sensitive to environmental issues.

The Vision and Mission of the College are communicated to the stakeholders through the following ways:

- Printed in the Brochure and the Prospectus.

- Communicated to parents during Parent-Student-Teacher (PST) Meetings.
- Communicated to all the students through their Mentors.
- The Principal highlights the Vision and Mission to the students and their Parents on Freshers' Day.

## 1.1.2 How does the Institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the Curriculum? Give details of the process and

#### substantiate through specific example(s).

- The Institution follows the Curriculum designed by the University.
- In the beginning of each Semester the Principal directs the HODs to hold the Department Level Meetings to schedule and chalk out the Action Plans for the effective implementation of the Curriculum.
- At the Department Level, the HODs schedule the workload in consultation with the faculty for the effective implementation of the prescribed Curriculum.
- It is the responsibility of the individual teachers to see that the Curriculum is implemented effectively in the classroom.
- Periodic Monitoring and Evaluation is done at the Department Level.

Examples:

- There is a system of collecting and consolidating the Absentees Slips daily. The number of classes taken by individual faculty is being displayed on the Staff Notice Board on a regular basis. The Principal monitors the system periodically.
- Effective functioning of the Mentoring System ensures the continuous monitoring of Student-Progress.
- Remedial Classes are arranged for the needy.
- The consolidated reports of the Continuous Evaluation, countersigned by the Principal are regularly being sent to the University.
- In order to check the effectiveness of implementation, the Stakeholders' Feedback is collected to modify/alter the implemented strategies, if needed.
- All the necessary infrastructural facilities (including ICT) for effective teaching learning are provided by the Institution.
- Individual faculty members have the freedom to select the library books to be purchased for the Central Library.

- The University provides orientation for the effective translation of the Curriculum in a phased manner.
- Orientation and Refresher Programmes are held by the University for

sensitizing the teachers on the latest developments in the respective fields and improving their teaching skills.

- University convenes regular meetings of the College-level Co-ordinators and holds teacher-Workshops for the effective implementation of the Choice Based Credit and Semester System.
- The Institution provides ICT enabled technologies for enhancing teaching effectiveness.
- The Network Resource Centre in the College provides ample opportunities for the academic community to explore the avenues of INFLIBNET. In addition to that the Institution provides e-learning facility to access the latest developments in various disciplines.
- The following facilities are available to ensure an effective learning experience:
  - 24 hours free Internet access in all Staff Rooms on NMEICT (National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology) Scheme.
  - The faculty and researchers in the Institution utilize the Internet facilities for Open Access Publication and downloading Open Access Journals.
  - ICT enabled Classrooms (12/18 classes are digital of which six are smart classrooms).
  - As a part of equipping the faculty on mobile learning, each department is provided with a NETBOOK and a Digital Camera.
  - CD Libraries in Departments.
- The students and faculty are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skill through the following methods:
  - <u>Blended Learning</u>: The Institution promotes face-to-face classroom methods with computer mediated teaching activities. This creates a more integrated approach for both the teachers and students.
  - <u>M-learning</u>: The College promotes M-learning with the use of mobile devices like Laptop Computers, Netbook Computers, Mobile Phones and Tablets so that learners can learn from various locations at their own pace. The objective of M-learning is to provide the learner the ability to assimilate learning anywhere and at any time.

- <u>Expert Lectures</u>: In order to sustain the academic quality, the College invites experts in various disciplines regularly for interacting with the academic community, which enables them to keep abreast of the recent developments.

- The College is keen on providing academic and infrastructural facilities for effective Curriculum delivery.
- The Institution deployed ICT into education with an objective of the creation of new possibilities for learners and teachers to engage in new ways of information acquisition and analysis.
- In the Infrastructure Masterplan prepared by the IQAC of the Institution, priority has been given to deploy and upgrade the IT infrastructure and associated facilities in the College.
- The Institution realizes that ICT support will help improve the quality of teaching learning process and the quality of Curriculum delivery on an equitable basis and will transform the culture and practice of traditional memory-based learning to education that stimulates thinking and creativity, necessary to meet the challenges of the century.
- Accordingly a second Computer Lab with 25 Computers has been set up in the College. In this Lab, facilities are earmarked for the students of Departments other than Computer Science so as to ensure that the IT facilities are available to all students in the campus.
- 12 Digital Classrooms, 2 each (3<sup>rd</sup> year and 2<sup>nd</sup> year Classes) in each Major Department have been set up in the College. The Institution is planning to provide Digital Classroom facility to the first year students of all the Departments too.
- The Computer Literacy Programme, which was started in 1995 at the very beginning of the College, aims at equipping the students with basic Computer knowledge.
- Students are given training at various levels and are encouraged to present Seminars using Power Point and such other Software.

  - ICT enabled Classrooms (12/18 classes are Digital of which six are Smart Classrooms)
  - As a part of equipping the faculty on Mobile Learning, each department is provided with a NETBOOK and a Digital Camera
  - CD Libraries in all departments
  - To equip the teachers with ICT enabled teaching, the IQAC organized a Regional Workshop on *Informatics* for the College Teachers across Wayanad sponsored by the Kerala State Higher Education Council (28-30 October 2010).

- The Curricula for all the Courses are designed by the respective Boards of Studies (BOS) of the Kannur University, to which the College is affiliated.

#### Industry:

- The Institution invites experts from various industries to deliver Expert Lectures and to interact with the students and teachers of the College.
- With the expert advice of such people, new trends are incorporated in the syllabus of UG Programme.

- Career and Placement Cell in consultation with the various Department organizes Industry-Institution interaction.
- 1.1.6 What are the contributions of the Institution and/or its staff members to the development of the Curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.
- The Curricula for all the Courses are designed by the respective Boards of Studies (BOS) of the Kannur University, to which the College is affiliated. The Kannur University has introduced Choice-based Credit and Semester System (CCSS) for UG Courses in the year 2009-10.
- As a prelude to this, 2 day/5 day subject-wise Workshops were conducted for restructuring the Curriculum. All permanent teachers of the College participated in these Workshops and many of them contributed to designing the Curricula of the new Courses.
- <u>Svndicate</u>: Dr Sudha Devi, Member of Kannur University Syndicate (2006-2010) and the Convener of the Standing Committee on Course and Research took active role in finalizing the Curricula of the UG and PG Programmes of Kannur University. She was a Member in the Syndicate Sub Committee constituted for the implementation of Choice based Credit Semester System (CCSS) at the UG level in the affiliated Colleges of Kannur University. She has also associated with the restructuring process of the Theory and Practical Syllabus of Biological Techniques.
- <u>Senate</u>: Two teachers, Dr Germina K A (1998-2001) and Dr Sudha Devi A R (2006-2010) had been Members of the Kannur University Senate.
- <u>Academic Council</u>: Three teachers of this Institution Dr. P K Prasadan, Dr Shaju P P and Dr A R Sudha Devi had been Members of the Academic Council (of Kannur University) - the highest academic body of the University.
- <u>Faculty</u>: Dr Rajiv Thomas is a Member of the Faculty of Science and Dr Shaju P P has been a Member of the Faculty of Communication of Kannur University. Dr Sudha Devi, being a Member of the Syndicate, had been a member of all Faculties of Kannur University during 2006-2010.

- <u>Research Council</u>: Dr Germina K A, Dr P K Prasadan, Dr Sudha Devi A R and Dr. Joseph K J are Members of the Research Council of Kannur University. Dr Raju George, the Principal and a Research Guide in English is a member of the Research Council of both the Kerala University and the MG University since 1994 and 1996.
- <u>P G Boards of Studies</u>: Three Faculty Members, Dr P K Prasadan, Dr Joseph K J and Dr Thomas Monoth have been members of the PG Boards of Studies in Zoology, Malayalam and Computer Science respectively of Kannur University. Dr Rakesh Kalia (Hindi), Dr Rajiv Thomas (Biochemistry and Pharmaceutical Chemistry) and Dr Maria Martin Joseph (Physical Education) were members of various PG Boards of Studies of the University of Calicut. In this capacity they played active role in designing the Syllabus of the PG Programmes in their respective subjects.
- <u>UG Boards of studies</u>: Dr Thomas Monoth is the Chairman of BOS in Computer Science of Kannur University and Member of the BOS of IT & Printing Technology in the University of Calicut. Dr Maria Martin Joseph is a member of the BOS of Physical Physical Education in the University of Calicut. Four other teachers, Dr Raju George, Principal (Functional English), Dr Germina K A (Mathematics), Dr Rajiv Thomas (Chemistry), Dr P K Prasadan (Zoology), Dr Shaju P P (Journalism Combined) and Dr Joseph K J (Malayalam), Dr Rakesh Kalia (Hindi), Ms Jisha T E (Computer Science) are members of various BOSs of Kannur University. Dr Rajiv Thomas had been a member of BOS in Biochemistry and Pharmaceutical Chemistry and Dr Shaju P P in the BOS of Journalism of the University of Calicut.
- <u>Expert Committee for Curriculum Designing</u>: Dr P K Prasadan had been the Chairman (2008-2012) of the Expert Committee in Applied Zoology for formulating the Curriculum and Syllabus of MSc Applied Zoology Course of the Kannur University. Dr Shaju P P had been the Chairman of the Expert Committee in Journalism of Kannur University. Dr Joseph K J has been a Member of the Expert Committee in Rural and Tribal Sociology for formulating the Curriculum and Syllabus of MA in Rural and Tribal Sociology of Kannur University.
- <u>Doctoral Committee</u>: Dr P K Prasadan had been the Chairman of the Doctoral Committee in Zoology of Kannur University from 2009-2012 and presently he is a Member of the Committee. Dr Sudha Devi A R (Zoology); Dr Germina K A (Mathematics) and Dr Joseph K J (Malayalam) are Members of the Doctoral Committees in their respective subjects.

- Ph D Course Work: Dr P K Prasadan is the first Co-ordinator of the ٠ PhD Coursework Programme in Zoology of the Kannur University. The Co-ordinator is responsible for designing the Syllabus of the Course Work and for preparing Model Question Papers for the University Course Work Examinations.
- Teacher Coordinator: Dr Savio James has been the Teacher Coordinator at the College level to look into the smooth functioning of the CCSS.
- Others: Dr P K Prasadan is Member of the Committee constituted by the Kannur University to study and report on 'Revamping of Credit and Semester System for PG Courses in the University Departments'.
- Formal feedback on Curriculum from the outgoing students and the Informal Feedback from Faculty and Alumni are collected, and are subjected to discussion in the departments concerned. - Organic Farming
- Herbal Medicine and Primary Healthcare
- **Computer Application**
- **Yogic Science**

The Institution has an efficient mechanism to analyse and ensure the realization of the Objectives of the Curriculum.

- IQAC prepares the Academic Masterplan and places it before the College Council for discussion and recommendation for implementation. As per the recommendations of the Council, the Institution implements the Teaching, Learning and Evaluation schedules as envisaged in the Masterplan.
- Based on this Plan and the University Schedule, the Institution prepares the Academic Calendar, which includes Teaching Schedule, proposed dates of various Curricular and co-Curricular activities and common Internal Evaluation Tests for the year.
- In the beginning of the academic year, HODs convene departmental meetings for work allotment and timetable setting.
- Examination timetable is displayed on Student Notice Boards well in advance.
- Syllabus and Question Paper Patterns are made available to the students in the beginning of every semester.
- At the end of every academic year, and of late after every Semester, the Principal and the Teaching Faculty meet for an evaluation of the academic activities of the year. Schedules for teaching, conduct of examinations, conduct of Seminars, Workshops and other Curricular & co-Curricular activities of the year are critically evaluated and each faculty presents before the community their suggestions for the betterment and plans for major academic Programmes for the next year.

#### 1.2 Academic Flexibility

# 1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development Courses etc., offered by the Institution.

In addition to the Regular Programmes, the Institution offered three Certificate Courses -1. Certificate Course in Communicative English, 2. Certificate Course in Organic Farming and 3. Certificate Course in Herbal Medicine and Primary Healthcare. In addition to this all the Departments have been offered a Course in Computer Application and Yoga and Health Sciences.

#### 1. Certificate Course in Communicative English

#### Introduction:

The Dept of English has been conducting a Certificate Course in Communicative English with UGC assistance since the Academic Year 2007-08. The Department has been organizing various Programmes and activities to help the students overcome difficulties with regard to the usage of English. The Certificate Course in Communicative English was started considering the fact that majority of the students, who belong to rural environment do not have adequate communication skills.

#### Aims and Objectives

- To train the students in the use of English for academic and interactional purposes
- To develop the Listening Skills of the students so that they can understand English in a range of contexts
- To develop the Speaking Skills of the students so that they can orally express thoughts, opinions and arguments in a variety of contexts
- To develop the Reading Skills of the students so that they acquire a range of reading skills and strategies to cope with academics and conversational exchanges
- To develop the Writing Skills of the students so that they are able to express in writing thoughts, opinions and arguments in a variety of contexts.
- To raise the students' awareness of English so that they acquire the ability to make use of the grammatical devices and lexical resources of English in efficient communication.
- To enable the students to develop into autonomous learners by mastering the language skills and thereby raise their competence and employability.

#### 2. Certificate Course in Organic Farming

#### Introduction

The Department of Zoology has been conducting a Certificate Course in Organic Farming. The backbone of the economy of Wayanad is agriculture. Unscrupulous and non-judicious application of Chemical Pesticides in the agriculture land resulted in the complete destruction of the soil fertility. A culture of traditional farming with emphasis on the application of organic materials as fertilizers and pesticides need to be inculcated among the public through the younger generation. The Institution considers this as their responsibility to make the students aware of the need of a thorough attitudinal change in future agriculture practices.

#### Aim and Objective of the Course

The Objective of the Course is to introduce the basic concepts of Organic Farming to the students and the local public.

#### 3. Certificate Course in Herbal Medicine and Primary Healthcare

#### Introduction

The Department of Biological Techniques has been conducting a Certificate Course in Herbal Medicine and Primary Healthcare. Modern healthcare system is inaccessible to the majority of population since it has become highly commercialized. It subjects them to a series of lab tests and diagnoses, often unnecessary, and stuffs them with all kinds of drugs that are mostly useless and even hazardous, all to the advantage of Drug Companies. In this juncture it is high time to promote Traditional Healthcare System among the younger generation.

#### **Objectives:**

- To understand the relevance of Herbal Medicines and their role in Primary Healthcare.
- To equip and empower people with sufficient knowledge on Herbal Medicines and Primary Healthcare.
- To promote health and disease prevention to sustain good health.
- To enable individuals and communities to take proper healthcare decisions

#### Choice Based Credit System and Range of Subject Options

• With the introduction of the Choice Based Credit Semester System by the University in the academic year 2009-10, students of one Department have the option to choose Open Courses offered by other Departments. Taking the requirements of students in mathematical skills, communicative skills, physical fitness, environmental awareness, culture potentials of economically important animals etc. into consideration, the Institution offers Open Courses in Business Mathematics, Communicative

English, Physical Fitness and Training, Environmental Science, Aquaculture, Sericulture and Apiculture respectively.

- The credits secured by a student through the Open Course from other Departments will be added to the total Credits earned by him/her in that Semester.
- In addition, there is an option for choosing the Second Language from among Malayalam, Hindi, French, Sanskrit and Arabic.
- As per the existing University Norms, once the Core Subject is chosen by a student at the time of admission to the first Semester, he/she does not get a chance to change the same.

#### **Courses Offered in Modular Form**

• The Open Courses offered in the fifth and sixth Semester UG Programmes only are in Modular Form.

#### Credit Transfer and Accumulation Facility

• The Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CCSS) offer the facility for Credit Transfer when a student gets transfer from one Institution to another under the same University.

#### Lateral and Vertical Mobility within and across Programmes and Courses

- Lateral mobility is limited to Open Courses only. Students of one Department have the option to choose Open Courses offered by other Departments
- University Rules do not allow Lateral or Vertical Mobility within and across any Programme or Courses.
- Being an affiliated College, the Institution is bound to follow the Rules and Regulations framed by the University in this regard.

#### **Enrichment** Courses

• The Institution offers Open Courses in Business Mathematics, Communicative English, Physical Fitness and Training, Environmental Science, Aquaculture, Sericulture and Apiculture. These Open Courses are to enrich students in mathematical skills, communicative skills, physical fitness, environmental awareness and culture potentials of economically important animals respectively.

- Students enrolled for regular UG Programmes have the option of doing Certificate Courses offered by the Institution.
- The following are the other Enrichment Programmes offered by the College:
  - Coaching for Competitive Examinations for SC/ST and Minority Students
  - Remedial classes for Slow and Disadvantaged Learners
  - Career Guidance and Placement Cell offers yearlong coaching Programme for students for entry into Services.

- The students of the Self-financing Programme are treated as equivalent to the students of the regular stream in every activity of the Institution.
- The College strictly follows directions given by the University regarding admission procedures, finalizing the fee structure and setting the qualification of teachers.
- The salary of the teachers is fixed by the College Management.

- The Institution also promotes better use of technology for teaching, learning, research and administration.

  - In the New Syllabi of all Subjects, emphasis has been given to improving the communication and computer skills.
  - A paper on *Informatics* has been included in the syllabus of all UG Programmes.
  - Major Departments, including the Physical Education Department offer Open Courses to the final year (5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> Semester) students. These Courses aim at enhancing the interdisciplinary skills of students and make them more suitable/equipped for employment. The students have the facility to choose their open Courses.
  - The Members of the Boards of Studies and other academic bodies of the University from this College made major contributions in drafting the syllabi of various undergraduate and Post Graduate Courses of the Kannur University.
- The Institution is keen on enriching the University Curricula through supplementary efforts for making the students competent.
- The Institution has an efficient Career and Guidance Cell to provide support for equipping them to meet the challenges in the job market. A number of Forums/Clubs/Associations etc. are there for supporting the students in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

#### **Better Career Options**

- The Career & Placement Cell and the Entrepreneurship Club organize various Programmes to provide the students better exposure to career opportunities and to equip them to meet the demands in the job market.
- The B Com Degree Programme offered in the College has a paper on Entrepreneurship.
- The College has a Career Guidance and Placement Cell (CGPC).
- The Mentors support their Mentees in setting the career priorities.

#### **Community Orientation**

• The Institution promotes activities targeting on the socio-economic development of Wayanad. The College carefully designs and monitors

academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular action plans so as to achieve this goal.

- The Institution promotes communal harmony among the students and makes the students aware of the significance of religious festivals and interreligious gatherings that promote *universal brotherhood*
- NSS and NCC activities along with the activities of various Clubs and Associations promote Community Orientation.
- The Institution encourages Student-Projects on social and environmental issues at the Departmental level.

- Every extra-curricular and co-Curricular activity of the College aims at inculcating Community and Social Orientation among the students.

## 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the Curriculum?

1. Feedback from Ongoing and Outgoing Students:

Feedback on Curriculum is collected from the students in an informal way during academic discussions. Formal Feedbacks on Curriculum/syllabus collected from the outgoing students of each batch are pooled by the Heads of respective Departments. After discussing the matter in the Department Councils the recommendations will be intimated to the members of Boards of Studies and other Academic Bodies of the University for further discussion at higher levels.

2. Feedback from Alumni:

Formal Feedbacks are collected from the Alumni during the Annual Alumni Meeting. Informal feedbacks from them are obtained during their College visits, through Social Networking, Emails, Phone Calls etc.

3. <u>Feedback from Parents</u>:

Informal Feedbacks are obtained from the parents during Parent-Student-Teacher (PST) Meetings/Interactions, which are held at least once in every six months. Formal Feedbacks obtained from the parents during Parent-Student-Teacher (PST) meetings are properly recorded.

4. <u>Feedback from Educationalists</u>:

Informal feedbacks are obtained from Educationalists through interactions when they visit the College.

5. Feedback from Academic Societies/Associations:

Data on academic matters/Curricula are also obtained through discussions in the Academic Committees of Teacher Organizations and Academic Societies/ Associations of teachers.

6. Feedback from Neighbouring Communities:

Interactions with neighbouring community are regular practices of this Institution. The extension Programmes organized by the College especially through NSS, NCC, Blood Donors Forums and other Clubs and Organizations etc. offer the Institution a chance to assess the effectiveness of such Programmes.

Thus, the feedback obtained from various stakeholders are subjected for serious discussions at various levels in the Institution and the fruits of the discussions are intimated to the College Management and Academic Policy Makers in the University through the members of Boards of Studies and other higher Academic Bodies of the University.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) monitors Academic Auditing and maintains quality in every activity of the College.

Through these efforts, the Institution plays a major role in enriching the Curriculum.

the community their suggestions for the betterment and plans for major academic and other Programmes for the next year.

#### 1.4 Feedback System

### 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the Institution in the design and development of the Curriculum prepared by the University?

- The Curricula for all the Courses are designed by the respective Boards of Studies (BOS) of the Kannur University to which the College is affiliated. The Kannur University has introduced Choice-based Credit and Semester System (CCSS) for UG Courses in the year 2009-10. As a prelude to this, 2 days/5 days' Subject-wise Workshops were conducted for Restructuring the Curriculum. All permanent teachers of the College participated in these Workshops and many of them contributed in designing of the Curricula.
- In the capacity of the members of the following academic bodies, majority of the faculty members of this Institution play a pivotal role in designing the Curricula of the undergraduate Programmes of the University (Please see 1.1.6 for details).
- Formal feedback on Curriculum from the outgoing students and the informal feedback from faculty and alumni are collected and are subjected for discussion in the departments concerned. The relevant suggestions/recommendations are conveyed to the members of the academic bodies of the University.

#### 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for Curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new Programmes?

Yes.

- 1. Feedback on Curriculum is collected from the students in an informal way during academic discussions.
- 2. Formal Feedbacks on Curriculum/syllabus collected from the outgoing students of each batch are pooled by the Heads of respective Departments. After discussing the matter in the Department Councils the recommendations will be intimated to the members of Boards of Studies and other Academic bodies of the University for further discussion at higher levels.

- 3. Formal Feedbacks are collected from the alumni during the Annual Alumni Meeting. Informal Feedbacks from them are obtained during their College visits, through social networking, emails, phone calls etc.
- 4. Informal Feedbacks are obtained from the parents during Parent-Student-Teacher (PST) meetings/interactions, which are held at least once in every six months. Formal feedbacks obtained from the parents during Parent-Student-Teacher (PST) meeting are properly recorded
- 5. Informal Feedbacks are obtained from educationalists through interactions when they visit the College.
- 6. Data on academic matters/Curricula are also obtained through discussions in the academic committees of teacher organizations and Academic Associations of teachers.

Thus, the feedback obtained from various stakeholders are subjected to serious discussions at various levels in the Institution and the fruits of the discussions are intimated to the academic policy makers in the University through the members of Boards of Studies and other higher academic bodies of the University.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) monitors Academic Auditing, sets *quality benchmarks* and plays a lead role in the maintenance of quality in every activity of the College.

Through these efforts, the Institution plays a major role in enriching the Curriculum.

1.4.3 How many new Programmes/Courses were introduced by the Institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new Courses/Programmes?)

Yes.

The Institution took initiative to introduce new Certificate Courses for the ongoing students of the College.

- 1. Rationale for introducing the Certificate Courses are:
  - a. <u>Certificate Course in Communicative English</u>: Majority of the students of this Institution are the products of Malayalam medium schools, hails from poor rural background and is first generation learners. Eventhough they are better in their major subjects, their English Language Communication Skill (both oral as well as written) is poor. If the Institution takes initiative to bring them up by providing opportunity to

improve their communication skill, their level of confidence can be elevated and they will be better equipped to meet the demands in the job market. This was the driving force in introducing the Course in Communicative English. Moreover, the facilities in the Language Lab can be better utilized for the Course.

- b. <u>Certificate Course in Organic Farming</u>: The Green revolution technology, particularly in India, led to manifold increase in food grains production, but has made demands on water, fertilizer and farm power. The effect of intensive cropping has resulted in deteriorating soil tilth and decreased organic matter content. High level of chemical inputs has been increasing the pollution hazard and resulting in further degradation of soil health. The increased use of agro-chemicals is polluting water and atmosphere and thus affecting the crop production, production of livestock. In order to create an awareness among the students and local public about the significance of organic farming, the Department of Zoology decided to offer a Certificate Course on Organic Farming.
- c. <u>Certificate Course in Herbal Medicine and Primary Healthcare</u>: Modern Healthcare is inaccessible to the majority of the population, as it has become highly commercialized. It subjects them to a series of lab tests for diagnoses, etc. often unnecessary and stuffs them with all kinds of drugs that are mostly useless and even hazardous, all to the advantage of Drug Companies. This Course is to make the younger generation aware of the relevance of Herbal Medicines and their role in Primary Healthcare.
- 2. With constant efforts by the College Management, two Ongoing Self Financing Courses (B Sc Computer Science and B Com with Computer Application) could be elevated to the status of Aided Courses. An Aided Course in the College ensures qualified (as per the UGC norms) teaching faculty, lesser tuition and other fee for the students, chances to get financial assistance from Governmental Agencies for academic development and better quality teaching and learning practices in the department concerned. This would change the academic quality of the Institution.
- 3. PhD Programme started in two Departments (Mathematics and Zoology) of the College.

#### 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

### 2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The Institution ensures publicity and 100% transparency in the admission process.

- The College ensures publicity and transparency through the prospectus and Institutional website: <u>www.marymathacollege.org</u>.
- The brochure and Prospectus are sent to Higher Secondary Schools in the districts of Wayanad, Kannur and Kozhikode at the time of announcement of Plus 2 result; admission notification is published in the Diocesan Bulletin and is announced in the churches of the Mananthavady Diocese.
- All the applications received are processed and ranked strictly according to Government and University Guidelines.
- Teachers from all departments are involved in the admission process.
- Rank Lists for General Seats, Community Quota, and Reservation Quota are published on the Notice Board separately.
- The method of calculation of Index Marks is also displayed on the Notice Board.
- Interview Cards are sent to all applicants in the Sure List Category and the Chance List Category, through India Post, well in advance of the interview dates.
- Considering the remoteness of Wayanad district, each Department contacts the applicants over phone and informs the scheduled date of interview.
- Admission to the various quota SC/ST, OBC, differently Abled and Sports is filled according to the Govt. Guidelines.
- Being a Govt aided Minority Institution, admission to the Management and Community Quota are filled by adhering to the stipulated norms.

- Applicants who attend the interview are admitted strictly according to the Order of Merit as published on the Notice Board.
- Fee Receipts are given immediately after payment of the fees.
- The General Rank List and the list of admitted candidates are sent to the University immediately after the completion of the Admission Process.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various Programmes of the Institution.
- Admissions to all UG and PG Programmes are based strictly on Merit; there is no Common Entrance Test for admissions.
- The norms and guidelines of the Government and the University, including reservation for socially backward and differently-abled persons are strictly followed.
- The minimum marks for admission is as prescribed by the University.
- For UG Courses, the eligibility criterion is a pass in Higher Secondary/equivalent examination. For PG Mathematics, 50% marks in B. Sc. Mathematics, for General Category and 45% for OBC and a pass for SC/ST.
- The admission process is fully automated.
- The Admission Committee, constituted according to the rules and regulations laid down by the University, comprising of the Principal, Heads of all Major Departments and the Office Superintendent monitors the admission process.
- Merit Lists are displayed on the Notice Board sufficiently early.
- The applicants can verify the list and, discrepancy, if any is noticed, they are given a chance to get it rectified within a stipulated time as per University Norms.
- The Selection Criteria are also displayed on the Notice Board.

#### 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the Institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

• Yes. The Admission Committee monitors the entire admission process. Merit List is displayed on the Notice Board and provision is given for the candidates

to verify the Grade Marks. The Method of Calculation of the Grade Marks is also displayed on the Notice Board.

• The Admission Committee is also responsible for reviewing the Admission Process and the Student Profile annually.

#### Outcome:

- Could evaluate that transparency is ensured in the admission process and only deserving students get admission for degree and postgraduate Programmes.
- Could evaluate that equity is ensured in the admission process as the
- Institution strictly follows University Norms and Govt Rules on reservation.
- Could evaluate the details on the social, educational and economic background of the admitted students and prepare a baseline statistical data on the same.
- Could evaluate the priority of courses chosen by the students and the cut of marks set for each course.
- 2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the Institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion
- a) SC/ST/OBC: Reservation Policy of the Government is strictly adhered to for ensuring admission for students from disadvantaged communities. The Interview Cards of SC/ST candidates are sent by speed post and they are also informed over the phone (if contact number is given). Unfilled vacancies, if any, reserved for students from these communities, are advertised in the newspapers thrice. Spot Admissions are given to the aspiring candidates (SC/ST), and in case no candidate turns up, the quota seat is kept vacant.
- b) *Women:* There is no discrimination between men and women candidates since the admission is based purely on merit and according to Government and University norms. The overall Student Profile of the College shows that on an average about 70% of the students admitted to UG courses and 98% of students admitted to PG course are women.
- c) *Differently-abled:* Government Norms on reservation are strictly followed. Three percentage of the total seats is reserved for such students.

- d) *Economically-weaker Sections:* There is no reservation for economically weaker sections of the society. However, a few deserving students from economically backward sections are given admission under Management Quota (20% of the total seats in each Department is reserved as Management Quota).
- e) *Sports Personnel:* One seat each is reserved for sports persons in every UG Programme. In addition, outstanding sports persons are given admission under Management Quota. Every year the Institution requests the University to provide additional seats to accommodate deserving sports personnel.
- f) *Any other (specify):* One seat is reserved for students from Lakshadweep in every UG and PG Programme. Being a Christian Minority Institution, 10% of the total seats in the degree Programmes are reserved for the students from the Catholic Community as per Kerala Govt. Norms. Students with outstanding performance in Fine Arts are given preference in the Management Quota.



#### Comments on the Trend:

The line diagram clearly shows that all the Departments in the Institution showed similar trends in the gradation in the number of applications received for the past four academic years. There was a slight increase during the period from 2009-10 to 2010-11 followed by a slight decrease in the number of applications received. During 2012-13 a big leap in the number of applications in each Department is clearly given in the Line Diagram.

#### Reasons:

• Fluctuation in the pass percentage of plus two examination in different years

• Attitudinal Change, in different years, among the plus two holders and their parents in opting/not opting Nursing and Engineering courses

#### 2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

### 2.2.1 How does the Institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- Differently-abled students are given relaxation in the eligibility for admission as per Government Norms; 3% of the total seats is reserved for such students.
- University also provides provisions for scribes and extra time during examinations for such candidates.
- The Institution is keen on addressing their special needs and treating them with special care.

#### 2.2.2 Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the Programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes.

- Faculty members are deputed to counsel the newly enrolled students on the prospects of the courses based on their aptitude and knowledge.
- Parents and students are counseled about the courses and facilities offered by the College.
- The two day Orientation Programme, combined with a Personality Development Course conducted every year for the Freshers, help the teachers to identify the aptitude and talents of the students.
- Based on the assessment made, inter-departmental transfers are allowed for deserving students within the framework of admission norms, provided seats are available.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the Institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the Programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.

- The credit and semester system recently introduced by the University provides ample opportunity for the newly enrolled students of PG and UG Programmes to bridge the knowledge gap.
- Teachers normally have intensive interaction with the students in the classroom, which enable them to decide the academic level of the students and to identify slow and advanced learners through class tests, assignments and seminars. Their entry level marks are also a criterion for assessing the academic level of the students.
- For the newly admitted students, the College conducts two days' Orientation Programmes to acquaint them with the College atmosphere, examination & evaluation processes, extra- and co-curricular activities etc. The first two weeks are set apart to bridge the knowledge gap to enable them to cope with the degree Programme chosen.
- Although there is no strict syllabus for the bridge course, emphasis is given to, revising pertinent topics studied in the Plus Two course and honing their language skills, assignment-writing skills, numerical and comprehension abilities.
- Since majority of our students had done their primary education (up to tenth standard) in rural schools, where the medium of instruction was the local language, Malayalam, their proficiency in the English language (spoken as well as written) is not up to the required level.
- Taking this factor as a serious academic matter, the Institution launched a project named *PEN-R* (*Project on English Newspaper Reading*) and subscribes English newspapers (currently students of each class get a minimum of three copies of English newspapers daily) at the very commencement of the Programme. Students are encouraged to read and analyze daily news items and to get themselves involved in discussions etc. so that students not only improve their language skills and general knowledge, but develop awareness on current social issues also.
- Facilities (Infrastructural and Academic- including Add-on Courses, Enrichment Programmes etc.) available in the Institution are being briefed to the students by their respective Mentors (welfare of students of each class is looked after and ensured by their respective Mentors).
- 2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Sensitization of Staff and Students on various issues related to gender, inclusion, environment, health and hygiene, marginalized communities of the society etc. are carried out in the Institution in the following ways:

- 1. Through various Media:
  - College Website (<u>www.marymathacollege.org</u>), College Calendar, Prospectus, News Letters and College Magazines
- 2. Through various Programmes including extension activities:
  - Orientation for newly enrolled students & Faculty, PTSA Meetings, Seminars/Workshops and Mentoring Activities
- 3. Through Forums/Clubs/Cells/Bodies:
  - College Students' Union, Women's Cell, Mentoring System, Anti-ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, NSS, NCC, Bhoomithrasena Club, Save Green Club, Film Club and Book Club
- 4. Through other methods:
  - > Posters/Banners and Stickers on the Campus for Disseminating Messages

## 2.2.5 How does the Institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Slow and Advanced Learners are identified through Continuous Evaluation, which includes Class Tests, Unit Tests, Terminal/ Internal Examinations, Assignments and conduct of Seminars and Presentations.

- Advanced learners are given challenging Assignments.
- They are encouraged to attend Seminars in the College and at other Colleges.
- A *Peer-Group Learning System* has been prevalent in all Departments. In this system, slow learners are grouped with advanced learners and are encouraged to study together. It becomes a challenging task for the advanced learners to enhance the learning abilities of the others.
- They are encouraged to give tuitions for school children.
- Teachers provide them opportunities to do independent study.
- They are encouraged to give Presentations/Seminars based on their reading.
- Additional Reference Books are recommended.

- They are encouraged to participate in various Intercollegiate Quiz and other Competitions.
- Special guidance is given to them for participation in various Competitive Examinations.
- Advanced Learners from the marginalized communities are given special assistance through the UGC funded Programme, *Coaching for Entry in Services*.

The advanced learners are offered avenues to interact with the academia of the premier Institutions of the country such as Central Universities, NITs, IITs, IIMs TIFRs, EFLU, ISI, Centre for Mathematical Sciences, CR Rao AIMSCS, Swaminathan Research Foundation, and IISC. The Institution also promotes the advanced learners' research aptitude. The departments of Mathematics, Zoology, English, Malayalam, Hindi, Journalism, Statistics, Computer Science, Commerce and Chemistry provide excellent ambience for research.

- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the Programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?
- Slow and advanced learners are identified through continuous evaluation, which includes class tests, unit tests, terminal/ internal examinations, Assignments and Seminars presentations.
- In the Institution, the students at the risk of drop out belong to the poor learners and economically and socially weaker sections of the society. Such students are given individual care and attention to retain them in the Institution.
- In addition to the *Peer-group Learning System*, teachers give special attention to such students.
- The Institution conducts remedial coaching utilizing UGC funds.
- Regular class tests and question paper discussions are held for slow learners in the Remedial Classes.
- Audio-visual Programmes, discussions on case studies etc. are also organized to motivate them.

Slow and advanced learners are identified through Continuous Evaluation, which includes class tests, unit tests, terminal/ internal examinations, Assignments Seminars presentations.

Teachers attend the needs of Slow Learners individually. The Institution conducts remedial coaching utilizing UGC funds. In remedial classes, the slow learners are given regular class tests followed by question paper discussions. Audio-visual Programmes, case studies and demonstrations are also organized to motivate them. Every department has special schemes for the benefit of slow learners and the Mentors concerned supervise such schemes and offer timely assistance. The progress is also constantly monitored. Students form self help units for group works.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

# 2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

At the end of every academic year the Principal and the Teaching Faculty meet for an evaluation of the academic activities of the year. Schedules for teaching, examination, conduct of Seminars, Workshops, and other curricular and cocurricular activities are critically evaluated and each Department presents before the community their suggestions for the betterment and plans for major academic Programmes for the next year. It is based on these suggestions that we chalk out the Programmes in the beginning of every academic year.

Based on this Plan and the University Schedule we prepare the Academic Calendar which includes teaching schedule, proposed dates of various curricular & co-curricular activities and common internal evaluation tests of the year.

From 2009 onwards the academic calendar follows the Choice Based Credit and Semester System and the College has rescheduled the academic and co-curricular activities accordingly.

• IQAC prepares the Academic Master Plan and place it before the College Council for discussion and recommendation for implementation. The College Council comprises of the Principal, IQAC Co-ordinator, Heads of Major and Physical Education Departments, representatives of complementary courses and languages, elected Teacher Representatives and Librarian as members. As per the recommendations of the Council, the Institution implements the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules as envisaged in the Academic Master Plan.

- Based on this Plan and the University Schedule the Institution prepares the academic calendar which includes teaching schedule, proposed dates of various curricular and co-curricular activities and common internal evaluation tests for the year.
- The Calendar displays:
  - Dates of Academic Events like:
    - 1. College Reopening after Every Vacation
    - 2. Examinations
    - 3. Admissions
    - 4. Conferences, Workshops and Seminars to be Organized
  - Duration of First / Second Term
  - Extra-curricular Events, Club Activities, Annual Social Days, Annual Sports Day, Study Tours, Picnic etc.
  - Number of teaching days and holidays.
- All Academic and Extra-curricular Events, Club Activities are organized in consultation with IQAC, with the support of Teachers, Administrative Staff and Students.
- In the beginning of the academic year, HODs convene Departmental Meetings for work allotment and timetable setting.
- Examination Timetable is displayed on Student Notice Boards well in advance.
- Syllabus and question paper patterns are made available to the students in the beginning of every Semester.
- From 2009 onwards the Academic Calendar follows the Choice Based Credit and Semester System and the College has rescheduled the academic and co-curricular activities accordingly.
- At the end of every Academic Year the Principal and the Teaching Faculty meet for an evaluation of the academic activities of the year. Schedules for teaching, conduct of examinations, conduct of Seminars, Workshops and other curricular & co-curricular activities of the year are critically evaluated and each Faculty presents before the community their suggestions for the betterment and plans for major academic Programmes for the next year.

#### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) formulates monitors and internalizes the quality enhancement measures of the College. IQAC plays an important role in academic planning and execution of various Programmes.

- The primary objective of the IQAC is to develop/ensure a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the Institution.
- The IQAC, right from its inception, has been taking initiatives in looking after the welfare of all the stakeholders of the College and ensuring sustenance and enhancement of quality in academic/administrative/co-curricular/extracurricular activities of the Institution.
- It generates good practices & ideas, plans, implements and measures the outcome of academic and administrative performances of the Institution.

Functions of IQAC in the Institution to improve the teaching-learning processes include:

- Setting the Quality Benchmarks/Parameters for the various Academic and Administrative Activities of the Institution and their implementation.
- Dissemination of Information on various Quality Parameters of higher education through Institution Website, Calendar, Prospectus, Newsletters etc.
- Motivation of the Academic Community in organizing Workshops, Seminars on quality related themes and promotion of quality circles, either directly or in association with other agencies inside (various clubs and organizations) or outside the campus (NGOs or GOs).
- Documentation of the Various Programmes /Activities
- Preparation of the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) to be submitted to NAAC based on the Quality Parameters.

The objective of M-learning is to provide the learner the ability to assimilate learning anywhere and at any time at his /her own pace.
- <u>Expert Lectures</u>: In order to sustain the academic quality, the College invites Experts in Various Disciplines regularly for interacting with the academic community, which enables them to keep abreast of the recent developments.

- Participation in Summer Schools and Training at Research Institutions
- Optimum use of Full-time free Internet facility available in all departments, NRC, the Central Library and Central Computer Laboratory
- Student Assignments, Seminars and Projects on topics of contemporary relevance in the respective subjects

- The College has an effective Mentoring System
- Every batch of students has a Mentor, who is responsible in looking after the welfare of that batch. Before and after the regular schedule 1 hr each per day is set apart for counseling, Mentoring and Academic Advice
- Mentors of the College are accessible, responsive, open-minded, student-oriented and dedicated to the development of his/her mentees.
- Mentors of this Institution are good listeners, able to offer honest and constructive criticism and willing to compliment their pupils' accomplishments.
- Mentors do these things in a confidential manner. They initiate contact with their pupils and devote time for the Mentoring Relationship.
- Mentors familiarize the pupil with the campus environment and culture and help the pupil set his or her priorities. Mentors establish both short and long term goals and follow up on pupils' progress.
- Mentor Records provide valuable data on mentees' academic achievements, cocurricular and extra-curricular activities in which the mentees participated/excelled, their parents' academic and financial background etc.
- Each Mentor monitors the academic as well as co-curricular performance of his/her mentees. The Mentor maintains constant interaction with the parents of their mentees.
- Advanced Learners in a Mentoring System are provided with reference books, other reading materials etc. and are encouraged to support the Slow Learners of their batch.
- Mentors provide their mentees the academic, personal and psycho-social support.
- There has been a Professional Counselor on campus in addition to the

Teacher-counselors to address the psycho-social issues of the needy students. The Professional Counselor maintains a record of the students who seek the support of the Counselor.

- Teachers other than Mentors also provide academic advice to the students. Before and after the regular schedule one hour each per day is set apart for Academic Advice.
- The Women's Cell of the College offers counseling to girl students. Regular awareness Programmes are conducted for them.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the Faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the Institution to encourage the Faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning? - The Institution has been endeavoring to fine-tune the educational process in the College through the implementation of Innovative Teaching Methods, bringing a wide array of innovative approaches into the academic process.
- *The democratization of the Educational Process*, is aimed at encouraging students to have a greater say in what concerns their studies, the contents of those studies as well as empower them to become leaders within their chosen field.
- A fundamental shift of the instructor's role from that of a teacher who delivers knowledge to the students and controls their performance to that of a facilitator, whose aim is to inspire students' creativity and independence, enhancing their motivation to acquire and master academic skills.
- *Co-operative Learning Method* focuses on the students' team work while doing their project assignments.
- All the above mentioned Innovative Teaching Methods stipulate the necessity of one more approach *the intensification of the academic process and enhancement of the students' motivation.* This is achieved by using various forms of curricular and extra-curricular activities including:

- ✓ e-lectures and other Visual Supports
- ✓ Use of Smart class rooms and Digital Classrooms
- ✓ Use of the Internet for academic purposes both by the students and the Faculty
- Finally, the last approach relates to the improvement of the Assessment system (including Test Assessment).
- The Institution has recognized the importance of ICT based learning and has been using facilities in the Audio-Visual Room for Power Point and Video Presentations.
- The College has 12 ICT enabled Class Rooms of which six are provided with Smart Boards. Since the Smart Classroom has Internet Connectivity, Videos and other Study Aids/Materials can be downloaded directly from the net to supplement the teaching-learning process.
- Each Department has a CD Library which includes the Presentations and Computer Aided Learning Packages prepared by the Faculty and Materials downloaded from the Internet.

#### 2.3.10 Does the Institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the Institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes.

- Shift to a New System Credit and Semester System teachers need to get adjusted with that the quantum of contents need be reduced so as to fit into the time schedule of Semester System-modification is possible in the next Syllabus Revision.
- Examinations, both Internal and External followed by the Centralized Valuation Camps conducted during the Two Semesters take at least three or four months out of the total 10 months of an academic year.
- Around 25% of time is taken away by Research, Extension and Faculty Development Programmes.

- Seminars/Workshops and Co-/Extra Curricular Activities also take away significant amount of academic time
- In order to overcome the above challenges, we resort to ICT enabled teaching that includes: e- & m-Learning, Blended/Hybrid and Flip Teaching; Peer learning, Group Assignments, Student Seminars etc. to complete the academic curriculum within the scheduled time frame.
- Whenever the Academic Time Table is suffered, the Institution makes alternate arrangements (preparing Special Time Tables, Organizing Special Classes, Arranging Expert Lectures etc.).

## 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The Institution has been trying to inculcate a Quality Culture on the campus through Quality Assurance Activities.
- The Institution is monitoring and evaluating the quality of teaching and learning through frequent feedback-collection at various levels, constant evaluation and performance analysis (Test Papers, Assignments, Seminars, Discussions etc.) of the Students.
- In order to monitor the quality of teaching and learning the Institution has an Academic Vision Plan which is realized through the Academic Master Plan and is put in motion through the system of Academic Hierarchy to which individual Faculty members are accountable.
- The challenge is linking the outcomes of QA to the development of a quality culture that enhances the student experience.

• Even though the Institution is keen on retaining these competent teachers by providing them with maximum possible academic and infrastructural facilities, academic freedom, and support for research promotion, the services of Dr P K Prasadan of Zoology and Dr Shaju P P of the Journalism Department had been extended to the Kannur University on deputation to establish new University Departments and to launch PG Programmes in their subjects. The services of Dr Sr K A Germina of the Mathematics Department have also been extended to the Central University of Kerala.

- The Modes of Evaluation Processes are available in the College calendar and the website.
- The Evaluation Methods and dates of Internal Evaluation Tests are communicated to the students by the teachers individually and are displayed on the College Notice Board, well in advance.
- The Mentor helps the students to get acquainted with the process of internal continuous evaluation that includes periodic test papers, presentation of Seminars & Assignments and regularity in attendance.
- Towards the end of each semester an *Examination Clinic* is held at the Department level, especially for the first years.

- The University introduced Grading System in UG Courses as a part of the introduction of Reforms in Evaluation Process in 2007-08. Continuous evaluation, in the new system, is done on the basis of Test Papers, Assignments, Seminars and Regularity in Attendance.
- In 2009, the Kannur University introduced Choice based Credit and Semester System (CCSS).
- Being an affiliated Institution, the College goes in conformity with the University Reforms.

# 2.5.3 How does the Institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the Institution on its own?

For the effective implementation of the Evaluation Reforms of the University, the Institution took steps in organizing Training Programmes and entrusting teachers to look after the developments in the implementing of Evaluation Reforms.

- A Coaching Programme was organized for the teachers on the Grading System, when the Kannur University introduced Reforms in the Mode of Evaluation at the UG level.
- After the Kannur University introduced CCSS in 2009, the Institution has appointed an Academic Coordinator, Departmental Coordinators and Advisors for ensuring effective implementation of the CCSS and formed a Grievance Redressal Committee to redress grievances, if any, on the Internal Assessment processes in the College.
- The College ensures regular, impartial and transparent conduct of examinations and continuous evaluation of the students in tune with the Specific University Regulations.

# 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

• University has adopted a system in which the performance of a student is evaluated from various perspectives.

- At the Formative Level a student is continuously assessed by the performance in internal examinations, assignments, Seminars and percentage of attendance.
- The Criteria for Summative Examinations are the performance in the End Semester Examination conducted by the University and Continuous Evaluation (CE) made by the College.
- Through this system the performance of a student can be evaluated at the Institutional as well as the University level.

- Methods of Monitoring the Progress and Performance of Students:
  - Through the continuous Evaluation Process that includes periodic test papers, assignments, Seminars and regularity in attendance in the case of theory courses and practical records, performance in the lab, regularity in the attendance and viva voce in the case of practical courses.
  - Through University Examination and Dissertation.

- The Evaluative Report after every Semester is intimated to the students in the presence of their parents through the Progress Cards that carry marks and the Mentor's comments on their performance.
- 2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.
- With the introduction of CCCS by the University, we have a rigorous and transparent Internal Evaluation System in place. The various components in the system are: Periodic Test Papers, Assignments, Seminars and regularity in Attendance.
- The College maintains detailed record for such internal marks and sends the consolidated marks to the University for the Final Result Sheet Preparation by the University.
- Because of the rigor and transparency in the Internal Assessment Process, the students are forced to attend the classes regularly, failing which they will have to repeat the semester.
- Seminars, Assignments and Viva Voce included in the Internal Evaluation promote independent learning and develop communication skills.
- 2.5.7 Does the Institution and individual teachers use assessment / evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes.

Assessment/Evaluation Processes, as directed by the University (that includes frequent test papers, assignments, Seminars and regularity of attendance), are taken as indicators for Evaluating Student Performance and achievement of Learning Objectives.

## 2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the College and at the University level?

- The Internal Marks awarded are displayed on the Department Notice Board. The students are free to approach their teachers in case they have any grievances regarding the marks awarded. Each Department maintains a Record of Internal Assessment Marks/Grades with the signature of each student.
- In case of any dispute, students can appeal to the *Grievance Redressal Committee for Internal Assessment*, consisting of the Principal and the Heads of all Departments.
- If the students are not satisfied with the decision of the Grievance Redressal Committee for Internal Assessment, they can approach the University, where a Grievance Redressal Cell functions. This Cell looks into complaints, makes enquiries, if necessary, and finds solutions.
- In the case of University Examinations, the students have the facility to apply for recounting of marks and revaluation of papers. The University also furnishes the photocopy of the answer scripts to students on request.

- To encourage all faculty members to submit Major and/or Minor Research Project proposals to various funding agencies that includes UGC, DST, KSCSTE, DoE, MoEF etc.
- To promote the conduct of Workshops/Seminars in various Departments.
- To encourage the faculty to attend Seminars/Workshops/Conferences.
- To encourage the teachers to carry out research to acquire Research Degrees (MPhil/Ph D).
- To approach the Kannur University for recognizing few more Departments as Research Centres.
- To motivate the faculty, having doctorate degree, to apply for recognition as Research Guides of Universities in and outside Kerala.
- To publish research findings of the faculty in reputed journals.
- To invite Eminent Scholars to all major Departments.

### Impacts:

- Two Major Projects completed; three Major Project Proposals submitted for funding.
- 12 Minor Research Projects (MRP) completed. Of the 26 permanent faculties 12 have completed MRPs; thirteen have ongoing MRPs and two have submitted proposals for funding.
- One International Workshop was organized in Mathematics Department (funded by UGC, CRRAI and KSCSTE).
- In association with Wild Life Trust of India, IQAC organized an International Seminar on Biodiversity Conservation.

- Four National Seminars were organized (assisted by UGC); one each in Biological Techniques, Chemistry, Computer Science and Mathematics Departments.
- One National Group Discussion (DST sponsored) was organized in Mathematics Department.
- Two National Level Expert Review & Monitoring Group Meeting in Mathematics were held in the College.

- Academic Orientation to the Administrative Staff, so that priority is given to the files/papers on research and other academic matters in the office.
- Support in granting leave to the faculty members to enrich their academic accomplishments through FDP Programmes.
- Encouragement to carry out part-time research work making use of the facilities in the College.
- Encouragement to present research papers in the Regional/Sate/National/ International Level Seminars/Workshops/Conferences/Group Discussions etc.

- Financial assistance for the establishment of Research Centres.
- Salary for substitute teachers in FDP vacancies in cases where the Government does not give permission to use the amount sanctioned by UGC.
- The Institution appreciates all the achievements of the Faculty and the College organizes common meetings to felicitate the faculty when they are awarded with Ph.D. degree.
- The Institution encourages the faculty having Ph D degree and publications to apply for research guideship.

## 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

- The faculty of this Institution realizes that scientific temper is not confined to Science Subjects alone or to laws, theories and formulae. Instead, it is a state of mind that always questions everything; seeking knowledge and being satisfied only when proven with substantial evidence.
- The Institution encourages the teachers to actively involve in the *popularization of science Programme* being organized within and outside the campus to imbibe a scientific temper among the academic community in general and the students in particular.
- Many teachers of this institution are Resource Persons in different areas of knowledge.
- In order to inculcate scientific temper among the students, the institution holds Seminars and Workshops, conducts Capsule Programmes, and organizes Science- Camps and Quiz Programmes for the students. Students are also encouraged to attend the camps of similar nature elsewhere.
- The students are encouraged to learn without bias and preconceived notions.
- The institution provides an academic environment for the students where they are not bound by mindsets. Such an environment enables them to discuss and argue over established norms, laws and theories; and feel free to put the views across without the fear of being ridiculed or rejected.
- Majority of the teachers in the institution are researchers, and that promotes scientific enquiry among students of all disciplines.

- A research culture has been inculcated in the Institution where the students seek logic, they question all that they observe and believe in applying their knowledge to practical use.
- Philosophy of Science is a part of the syllabus of many courses in the Institution.
- Project work is a part of the curriculum of all disciplines offered in the institution.

- In the XI Five Year Plan, three Faculty Members have availed Sabbatical Leave on FDP Scheme of UGC; one among them has been awarded Ph D degree and another faculty has submitted thesis.
- Among the seven faculty members planning to register for the Ph D degree (during XII five year plan), three teachers have got approval as Assistant Professors very recently.

- With the concerted effort of the Research Committee, the Institution could inculcate a research culture in the campus.
- Faculty Development Programme of the UGC was helpful in improving the academic and intellectual environment of the Institution. It has provided enough opportunities for the Faculty to pursue research and to participate in Seminars / Conferences / Workshops at Centres of Higher Learning.
- Participation in FDP Programmes has enabled the faculty members to update their research and pedagogical skills.

- The Institution encourages the teachers to actively involve in the popularization of science Programme being organized within and outside the campus to imbibe a scientific temper among the academic community in general and the students in particular.
- Many teachers of this institution are Resource Persons in different areas of knowledge.
- They are active in knowledge disseminating Programmes organized by agencies like OISCA International, Kerala Sastra Sahitya Parishad, Schools, Clubs, NGOs etc. outside the campus. Latest developments in areas of knowledge are disseminated to the common man.
- Research works carried out by the teachers and the students of various departments focus mainly on the local environmental and social issues, and therefore have a direct impact on the society.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the

percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

- The Institution makes the faculty equipped to mobilize funds for research and motivated to stand on their own (in research), instead of giving seed money to them.
- The Research Committee of the Institution opens avenues before the faculty to mobilize research funding from various agencies.
- The Committee encourages faculty members who have interest in research, to submit research project proposals and/approach funding agencies for mobilizing financial support for research.
- The institution provides administrative, infrastructural and academic support to its faculty for submitting research project proposals & operating research projects, realizing the fact that such supports are crucial for any institution to excel in research.
- As a result of the initiatives taken by the Research Advisory Committee and the Institution, 25 Minor Research Projects and 2 Major Research Projects sanctioned by the UGC are either completed or in progress.
- A few proposals to carry out minor research projects submitted by the faculty members are under consideration for financial support from UGC.
- A few more proposals from the faculty members to carry out Minor Research Projects are under consideration by UGC.

## 3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

- Financial assistance from the UGC, DST, KSCSTE and the University, are being made available to the research students in the two Research Centres of the Institution.
- In addition to that, the Project Assistants in the Major Research Projects are being provided with remuneration set aside.
- The process of promotion of research culture among students is ensured by facilitating participation of students in research and related activities, providing them with resources and other facilities.
- The teachers also support the undergraduate students to carry out their project

work.

# 3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

- The faculties are empowered to take up research activities utilizing the existing facilities.
- The institution encourages its staff to engage in interdisciplinary and interdepartmental research activities and resource sharing.
- Researchers in all subjects consult the Department of Computer Science for sharing of expertise and infrastructure.
- Science researchers consult the faculty of the Department of English for effective scientific writing. Mr Biju Joseph of the Department of English supports the researchers of other Departments in problem identification, setting of hypothesis, language editing and/or project proposal preparation.
- The expertise of Dr Geetha Antony of Statistics Department is being utilized for statistical analysis of data in science research.
- The Expertise of Dr Joseph K J, Associate Professor of Malayalam in this College and Expert Committee Member in the Kannur University Dept of Tribal Sociology, is being utilized for Tribal Studies Research.

- <u>Research Centres</u>: The Institution is keen on providing maximum possible facilities to promote research activities.
  - Department of Mathematics and Department of Zoology are recognized Research Centres of Kannur University.
  - The Mathematics Research Centre (MRC) has a research library with 35 research journals, a large collection of published papers and nearly 1500 volumes of books.
  - The Zoology Research Centre (ZRC) is well equipped with a Leica Research microscope having photomicrography facility, Poly Acrylamide Gel Electrophoresis Unit, Phase Contrast microscope, Monopan balance, Hot air oven, Distillation unit, Waterbath, pH meter, Oculometer, Incubator, Autoclave, Magnetic stirrer, Chemical balance, Spectrophotometer, Colorimeter etc. Most of these equipments are essential for Bio-science research.
  - Z R C has a good collection of research papers and 12 scientific journals. Centralized LPG and water supply are ensured in ZRC. Both research centres have 24 hours free Internet connectivity.
- <u>Centralized Library with INFLIBNET facility</u>: The Central Library of the Institution is equipped with a fully automated system of access, Internet facilities with access to e-books, and e-journals through INFLIBNET, research journals, and 12394 volumes of books. New books are being added every year.
- <u>Network Resource Centre (NRC)</u>: A UGC funded NRC has been set up in the Library to promote research and to inculcate scientific temper among the students of the Institution.
- <u>A Research Committee</u> is constituted in the College to look after and promote research activities in the Institution.

- <u>Administrative support</u> in timely submission of project proposals and reports of research activities to funding agencies.
- <u>Academic freedom</u> is provided in the campus.
- <u>Uninterrupted power supply</u> is ensured in the campus.
- The researchers have freedom to utilize the infrastructure facilities in the campus even on holidays and on off hours.
- Research Advisory Committee and Infrastructural Committee of the Institution take care of planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities for research.
- Priority is given to promote research culture among students and teachers while designing the infrastructure master plan.

Outreach Programmes organized by the College can be categorized into two: a) *Educational Outreach Programmes* for the dissemination of knowledge to students of neighbourhood schools and general public by using the human resources available in the College and b) *Social Service Outreach Programmes* for improving the living conditions of the socially marginalized sections of the society and for motivating and inspiring them to improve themselves.

#### Educational Outreach Programmes:

- 1. Faculty Members of different departments give demonstration classes on social/environmental issues to the students of neighbouring schools and colleges. They organize Programmes/are resource persons in various Schools, NGOs and Tribal Colonies.
- 2. The Department of Mathematics conducts *Mathematics Olympiad* for the High School and Plus Two students of Wayanad District every year. More than 100 students/year participate in the event.
- 3. The Department of Computer Science organizes *IT Mela* and Quiz Competition for the Higher Secondary students of Wayanad district.
- 4. Major Departments organize Regional Seminars, Group Discussions, Quiz Competitions, etc. for the Undergraduate and Postgraduate students of Kannur University.
- 5. The Institution organizes Faculty Improvement Programmes for the teachers of High Schools and Higher Secondary Schools.
- 6. The College has been collecting *materials of archeological importance* and organizing exhibitions for the students and the local people.
- 7. The Department of Commerce organizes Socio-economic Surveys and Developmental Programmes in tribal colonies.
- 8. *Master Mind Business Quiz* is an annual competition organized by the Department of Commerce for the Higher Secondary School students of Wayanad district
- 9. The Department of Zoology conducts surveys on the non judicious application of chemical pesticides and fertilizers on various agricultural crops of Wayanad, their impacts on environment and human health etc.
- 10. Campaign on *Reduce, Reuse and Recycle Plastic Products* has been organized by the Department of Zoology.

- 11. The Department of English took the initiative to depute their students as Interpreters to a delegation of Foreign Journalists and the Local Farmers.
- 12. The College encourages students to participate in Literary Workshops, like *Ezhuthupura, Workshop on Script Writing, etc.* and Theatre Camps organized by other institutions/ agencies.
- 13. The College organizes Annual Elocution Competition

#### Social Service Outreach Programmes:

- 1. The NSS and NCC units are the major organizations of the College that organize various social service Programmes on a regular basis. The details are given elsewhere.
- 2. An Employment Training Centre for Tribal Women has been established by the College at Appappara.
- 3. Aiming at the uplift of the downtrodden tribal people in the neighbouring colonies and fostering their children to education and employment, the Institution established a Social Initiative named the Mythry Community Development Programme.
- 4. The Women Cell organizes special training Programmes to empower the girl students and women.
- 5. With the support of Medical Professionals, the Institution provides AIDS awareness among the students and the general public.
- 6. The College promotes Awareness on Environmental Issues through the activities of the Save Green Club. The Club arranges Nature Appreciation Camps, Screens documentary films and organizes demonstration classes.
- 7. The AICUF unit of the College in association with the Jesus Youth collects and distributes dresses to the inmates of Orphanages and Old Age Homes. Food packets are distributed to the patients of the District Hospital, Mananthavady.
- 8. The volunteers of the Bhoomitrasena Club visits organic farms and interact with the farmers.
- 9. In collaboration with the Soil Testing Lab of the Govt of Kerala, the Bhoomitrasena club established *a soil testing facility* in the College.
- 10. The Department of Water Resources, Govt of Kerala, selected the Bhoomitrasena Club of this Institution to establish JALASREE HARITHASALA- a free Drinking Water Quality Analysis Unit in the

College. The Department provided training to the Co-ordinator and supplied free kit to the Club.

In addition, many members of the staff, both teaching and non-teaching and students are involved in various social service activities

### 4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

At present the Institution does not have students with physical disabilities. The College is ever aware of the different needs of the differently-abled students. The Institution is ready to provide infrastructural facilities to meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities.

### 4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

### • Computer facility including access to Internet in hostel:

Since the hostel is in the campus itself and very close to the College buildings, the inmates of ladies' hostel can make use of the Computer and Internet facilities in the college in the morning and evening hours and on holidays. The WiFi facility in the Campus may also be utilized by the students.

### • Facilities for medical emergencies:

First Aid Box is available in the Hostels. The hostel inmates make use of the medical services provided by the Govt Health Centre situated near (hardly 200 mts away) the College Hostel. The College maintains an MoU with the St Joseph's Hospital (run by the College Management) for providing medical assistance to the students of the College, especially to the hostel inmates, when needed.

### • Hostel Facility – Accommodation available

A hostel (partially funded by the UGC and the College Management) for girls with the capacity of 40 students and another one in the campus run by nuns and recognized by the Institution provides accommodation for 50 girl students of the college.

• Recreational Facilities, Gymnasium, Yoga Center, etc.:

Since the hostel is in the campus itself and very close to the College buildings, the inmates of ladies' hostel can make use of the facilities in the college in the morning and evening hours and on holidays. Hostel provides recreational facilities like caroms and chess other than Dish TV.

### • Library facility in the hostels:

The hostel maintains a small library with 200 books, news papers and Magazines. Students make use of the library facility in the College as the College is very close to the Hostels.

### • Internet and Wi-Fi facility.

The Institution provides WiFi facility in the campus. Since the hostel is in the campus itself and very close to the College buildings, the inmates of Ladies' Hostel can make use of the Computer and Internet facilities in the college in the morning and evening hours and on holidays.

### • Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments:

The College Hostel provides a common room with recreational facilities like Caroms and Chess other than Dish TV.

### • Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy:

The staff members of the College hostel are staying in the hostel itself.

• Constant supply of safe drinking water:

Yes, one water purifier has been installed to provide safe drinking water at all times.

• Security:

A watchman is appointed to look after the security of the college hostel.

# 4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

• The academic community of the College utilizes the services of the Government Health Centre located next to the entrance of the College.

- Medical help, whenever required, is made available from the Government Health Centre, St Vincent hospital, and the District hospital Mananthavady which are in the vicinity of the College.
- The Management of the College (Catholic Diocese of Mananthavady) runs a hospital-St Joseph's hospital- in Mananthavady town and maintains an MoU with the hospital administration to provide emergency medical service to the hostellers of this College.
- First Aid kits are available in the College and the Hostel.
- Annual Medical Inspection of students is held regularly.
- The institution conducts Blood Grouping of students every year.
- The Department of Zoology organizes several health awareness Programmes for the students
- 4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal Unit, Women's Cell, Counseling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, Recreational Spaces for Staff and Students, Safe Drinking Water Facility, Auditorium, etc.
- **IQAC**: A well furnished IQAC room (Area 275 sq ft) with facilities for documentation, printing, scanning, Internet browsing, holding meetings and discussions, digital presentation facility (mounted LCD), etc.
- Grievance Redressal Unit: No separate room has been earmarked for this purpose; however, depending on the needs of the students, audio-visual room, auditorium or Students' Union room is made available for the Grievance Redressal Unit.
- Women's Cell: A bath attached room (275 sq ft) with 2 cots and first aid facility
- **Career Guidance and Placement Unit**: A separate class room with computer and Internet connectivity. The Unit provides study materials like books and video & audio CDs for the students. The teacher in charge of the Career Guidance Cell is available at the Centre for Guidance.

- **Health Centre**: Nil. However, a Govt. Health Centre is housed in a building near the college entrance. The academic community of the college makes use of the facility in the Centre.
- **Canteen:** A well furnished and spacious (total area 3000 sq ft) canteen with separate space for students and staff. Ample number of wash basins and two toilets are also part of the canteen facilities.
- **Recreational Spaces for Staff**: A room with facilities for caroms, chess and playing cards.
- **Recreational Spaces for Students**: Room with facilities to play Table Tennis, Caroms, Chess and Judo.
- Safe Drinking Water Facility: It is an important concern of the Institution. In the College, six drinking water units are made available for the students near the staircases on each floor in the main building, (each such Unit consists of a water purifier fixed on the wall and a steel vessel fixed on metal stands), two in staff rooms and one in the office.
- Auditorium: A spacious (Total area 2500 sq ft) multipurpose indoor sports facility with a permanent stage in the ground floor.
- Audio-Visual Room: Fifty Jefferson Chairs, TV, Computer, Digital Video Camera, VCD Player, OHP and Mounted DLP Projector are available in the Audio-Visual cum Seminar Hall
- **Counseling Center** with a Computer and Internet connectivity: The service of the Professional Counselor is available as per the need of the counselees.
- Vehicle Parking Facilities (25 cars can be parked at a time)
- A parking area exclusively for students
- Student Centre (Area: 200 sq ft) with computer and Internet connectivity
- **Toilet Facilities:** Five for Girls, 1 in the Women's Cell, 5 for boys, 1 common near the staircase, 2 in the canteen, 2 near the Student Centre, 4 for the Teaching Staff, 1 each in Chemistry and BT Labs, 1 in Maths Research Centre, 1 in the Office; 1 attached to the Principal's Cabin and 1 attached to Manager's Room and for the Visitors Room). An additional toilet with six units and wash basin facility has been constructed for girls in 2012.
- Free Internet Connectivity: Principal's Cabin, Manager's Cabin, rooms of Heads of all Departments, staff rooms, Councilor's room and College office.

Besides a good number of faculty who have Research Projects have their own Internet Connectivity.

- Network Resource Centre (NRC) with One Server and 12 nodes, Web Camera, Scanner, CD Writer and Laser Printer.
- Information and Library Network (INFLIBNET): Centre helps in the sharing of library and information resources and services among the academic community of the institution, and with Academicians and Research Institutions. INFLIBNET works collaboratively with the Indian University Libraries to shape the future of the academic libraries in the evolving information environment. It plays a major role in promoting scholarly communication among academicians and researchers in India.
- Language Laboratory: Digital with one server and 10 Computers with Internet connectivity
- Herbal garden: Area 25 cents; Number of species of plants 112)
- **Chapel/Prayer Rooms:** One in the Second Floor of the main building which is open for students and staff of all communities and another in the second floor of the Canteen cum Guest House building. Everybody stands still during the College Anthem at 10 hrs and stands in attention during the National Anthem at the end of formal classes in the evening, in respect of the Institution and the Nation respectively.
- Visitor's Room: Attached to the Principal's and Manager's Cabins
- Co-operative Store: In the Canteen cum Guesthouse building
- **Guest Rooms**: Three guest rooms are available in the Canteen cum Guesthouse building
- **Bus Shelters**: One on either side of the entrance of the College (Area: 400sq ft)
- **BSNL Tower**: It is sanctioned on the campus at the initiation of the Administration and is likely to be commissioned in the next Academic Year.

Yes. The College has a Library Advisory Committee with the Librarian as the Coordinator, the Office Superintendent, Finance Officer (appointed by the Manager), Chairman & Vice Chairperson of Students Union and Heads of all Major, Complementary, Language & Physical Education Departments as Members. The Library Advisory Committee, in consultation with the IQAC, looks after the functioning of the Library. Its responsibilities are:

- Ensure the proportional distribution of the allocated fund for book purchase.
- Monitor and approve the list of books, journals and other reading materials to be purchased.
- Recommend enhancement of the facilities in the library.
- Analyze students' feedback on the services of the library and make recommendations, if needed, to the college authority.
- Redress the grievances, if any, related to the library functioning.
- Schedule the Induction Programmes for newcomers.
- Encourage the College Community for the optimum use of the library facilities.

### 4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

- The Institution is keen on the deployment of ICT into education that will result in the creation of new possibilities for learners and teachers to engage in new ways of information acquisition and analysis.
- In the Infrastructural Master Plan prepared by the IQAC of the Institution, priority has been given to deploy and upgrade the IT infrastructure and associated facilities in the College.
- The Institution realizes that ICT support will help improve the quality of teaching learning process and the quality of education delivery on equitable basis.
- The strategy of the institution is to transform the College into an *Information and Knowledge-driven ICT Literate Campus* within a short period time.

- The Institution, is therefore, committed to a comprehensive Programme of rapid deployment and utilization of ICT within the College to transform the education system and thereby improve the quality of the society in general and stakeholders in particular
- It is the Institution's desire that through the deployment of ICT in Education, the culture and practice of traditional memory-based learning will be transformed to an education system that stimulates thinking and creativity necessary to meet the challenges of the Century.
- Accordingly a second Computer Lab with 25 computers has been set up in the College. In this lab, facilities are earmarked for the students of Departments other than Computer Science so as to ensure that the IT facilities are available to all students in the campus.
- 12 digital class rooms, 2 each (3<sup>rd</sup> year and 2<sup>nd</sup> year classes) in each major Department, have been set up in the College. The Institution is planning to provide digital class room facility to the first year students of all the Departments too.
- 4.3.4 Provide details on the provision made in the annual budget for procurement, upgradation, deployment and maintenance of the computers and their accessories in the institution (Year wise for last four years)
- The Infrastructure Development Committee (in consultation with the IQAC) of the institution is responsible for planning, and monitoring the purchase & maintenance of computers.
- Computer Systems are upgraded on the basis of the recommendations of this committee on a need basis. Institution has a Technical Asst., in the Department of Computer Science to look after the maintenance of computers. For major repairs and replacement of hardware, professionals are employed on a pay-per- job basis.
- When new funds are allocated, the institution purchases computers of higher configuration and also a part of the fund is used for upgrading the older systems.
- A provision is made in the annual budget for updation and maintenance of computers in the institution.

- Whenever there is a paucity of funds in the College, the management of the Institution supports the maintenance and upgradation of computers on an annual basis.
- The computers and accessories are maintained through Annual Maintenance Contracts signed with the firm concerned (M/s. Megatech and M/s Radha Electricals, Kozhikode) and the day-to-day maintenance is done by the Technical Assistant of the Computer Science Department.
- The expertise of the faculty is also put in practice for services. However, major repairs are done on a pay-per-job basis.

# 4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

- The Institution provides 12/18 digital classrooms of which 6 with smart boards
- Computers with free Internet connectivity in all staff rooms
- Each Department is provided with a Netbook Computer and Digital Camera
- Well equipped Computer Lab for the students and faculty of the Department of Computer Science.
- A second Computer Lab with 25 computers for the students of Departments other than Computer Science so as to ensure that the IT facilities are available to all students in the campus.
- NRC in the Library with INFIBNET facility
- Audiovisual Room with mounted LCD and other facilities
- Promote M-Learning and Blended Learning
- Teachers prepare study materials in e-format and encourage the students to prepare their assignments and present their seminars using ICT facilities

- The learning is made student centric by adopting variations in teaching methods suited to the learning abilities of the students.
- The Institution established ICT facilities for the creation of new possibilities for learners and teachers to engage in new ways of information acquisition and analysis.
- Students are encouraged to utilize ICT facilities to the maximum extent to prepare their assignments and present their seminars.
- Students and teachers are familiar with the NRC facilities and utilize them optimally.
- The Institution promotes 'Blended Learning', i.e. face-to-face classroom methods with computer mediated teaching activities. This creates a more integrated approach for both teachers and students.
- The College promotes M-learning with the use of mobile devices like Laptop Computers, Notebooks, Mobile Phones and Tablets so that learners can learn from various locations. The objective of M-learning is to provide the learner the ability to assimilate learning anywhere and at any time.
- Many teachers prepare study materials in e-format and make them available to the students through Blogs, e-mails or CDs.
- Facility of Language Lab is used by students as *self practicing tools*.
- With efficient support of ICT enabled teaching learning facilities and the system of promotion of independent learning, *the teachers render the role of facilitators*.

- Since the major financial source to the Institution is UGC, the Teacher in Charge of the Department of Physical Education is given the additional charge of the Coordinator of UGC projects. He, in consultation with the Manager, Principal and IQAC, prepares proposals to the UGC and co-ordinates the final settlement of allocated funds.

### 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- The infrastructure development committee in consultation with the IQAC of the institution is responsible for planning, purchase and maintenance of computers.
- Computer Systems are upgraded on the basis of the recommendations of this committee on a need basis.
- Institution has a Technical Staff, in the Department of Computer Science to ensure the maintenance of the computers. For major repairs and replacement of hardware, professionals are employed on a pay-per- job basis. When new funds are allotted, the institution purchases computers of higher configuration and also a part of the fund is used for upgrading the older systems. An amount is set apart in the annual budget for updation and maintenance of computers in the institution.
- Whenever there is a paucity of funds, the College Management supports the maintenance and upgradation of computers on an annual basis.

- The maintenance cost of sophisticated equipment in the Research Centers is met from the contingent grant or from the other permitted heads of the ongoing Major Research Projects.
- Equipment in the other Departments/labs are maintained annually by technicians hired for the purpose.

### 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

Each Department reports their needs regarding the calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments and the Institution takes necessary measures on priority and urgency basis.

### 4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- The Technical Asst. in the Computer Science is vigilant on the proper functioning of the computers and other related equipment/accessories.
- The computers and accessories are maintained through Annual Maintenance Contracts with the firm concerned (M/s Megatech and M/s Radha Electricals Kozhikode) and the day-to-day maintenance is done by the technician of the Computer Science Department.
- The expertise of the faculty is also put in service. However, major repairs/services are done on a pay-per-job basis.
- Uninterrupted power supply to sophisticated instruments is ensured by installing a number of UPSs in the Institution.

- Academic Counseling is given mainly through the Mentoring System which functions effectively in the College

- The Women's Cell of the College offers counseling to girl students. Regular Awareness Programmes are conducted for the girl students.

### 5.2 Student Progression

More than 95% of UG students and 100% of PG students progress to higher studies or employment. The Alumni association helps in keeping track of the higher study plans of the students. On an average, about 20% of the students in the PG Class enroll for PhD Programme. Given the current scenario, which is one of the new interfaces between various disciplines, there are ample chances for higher studies and placement options.



• The drop-out rate is generally low (>5% including students who leave the college to join professional courses).

- Apart from discontinuing the course for joining professional courses, some girl students particularly from the Muslim community, who get married during their study period discontinue their studies.
- To bring down the number of such dropouts, parents and/or husbands are advised against discontinuing the studies.

- With an objective of achieving the overall development of students through co-curricular activities, the Institution constituted a number of Forums/Clubs/ Associations under the leadership of faculty members.

### 6.1.6 How does the College groom leadership at various levels?

Decentralization of academic administration is the policy of the College. It grooms leadership at various levels.

• <u>At the Level of the Board of Governors</u>: Board of Governors is the highest hierarchical body of the Institution. The Management ensures the inclusion of Principal, Deputy Director of the Collegiate Education, Co-ordinator of IQAC, Representatives of Faculty, Local Self Government Bodies and other Stakeholders in the Board.

- <u>At the Level of the College Manager</u>: The Management, the Catholic Diocese of Mananthavady, entrusts a Senior Administrator as the College Manager to function as a bridge between the Board of Governors and the Principal.
- <u>At the Level of the Principal</u>: Principal is the highest administrative personnel in the College, who reports to the Manager. The Principal is held responsible for the effective execution of academic and administrative policies & plans of the Government, University and the Management. Through the decentralized system, the Principal coordinates and looks after the effective functioning of the College.
- <u>At the College Council Level</u>: College Council is the Advisory Body to the Principal in Academic and Administrative matters. It comprises of the Principal as the Chairman, Heads of all Major Departments & the Department of Physical Education, representative faculty from the Complementary Subjects, Second Languages and the Physical Education, Co-ordinator of IQAC, College Librarian and the office bearers of the Teaching Staff Association as members.
- <u>At the Heads of Department Level</u>: As a part of the decentralization policy, the responsibility of looking after the academic activities of individual Departments is entrusted to the most senior faculty of each Department. HODs are empowered to take decisions regarding the Academic Plan of the Department.
- <u>At the Level of Mentors</u>: Every batch of students has a Mentor who is responsible in looking after the welfare of that batch.
- <u>At the Level of Individual Faculty</u>: There are a number of Forums, Clubs and Organizations which functions under the leadership of one or more faculty members (Teacher Co-ordinators).
- <u>At the Level of Students' Union</u>: Incorporating the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendation at the behest of the Honourable Supreme Court, to ensure peaceful teaching-learning on the campus, a democratic system of electing Students' Union prevails in the College. A male and female representative (Class Reps) each are elected from every class. The Chairman, General

Secretary, University Union Councilor, Secretary to the Fine Arts Association, Student Editor to the College Magazine, General Captain to the Sports and Games activities, Secretaries to the Department Associations and Representatives of 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> year Students are elected through Parliamentary Mode of Election. Two seats, the Vice Chairperson and the Joint Secretary are reserved for girl students.

- <u>At the Level of the Office Superintendent</u>: Principal is the administrative head of the College and the College office functions under the leadership of the Office Superintendent. He acts as a link between the administrative team and the Principal.
- <u>At the Level of IQAC</u>: IQAC is responsible for the development & application of quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic & administrative activities of the institution, motivation of the academic community in organizing workshops, seminars on quality related themes and documentation of the various Programmes/activities.
- <u>At the Level of Parent Teacher Association</u>: Two Parent Representatives (one male and another female) from each class constitute the Representative Council of the PTA. The Executive Committee comprises of one representative each from every Department. The Vice President is elected from the Executive Committee.

- The Governing Body gives the overall directions with regard to the Academic, Administrative and Infrastructure development. Both the Manager and the Principal transmit the directions given by the Governing Body to the academic community, and other stakeholders.
- Principal delegates the powers (with regard to the academic matters and administrative affairs) to the Heads of Departments. HODs are empowered to take decision on academic matters at Department level. The HODs transmit the powers to the Mentors and individual teachers.
- In the College, every activity is coordinated by one or more faculty members.

• IQAC takes a pivotal role in ensuring that the institution delegates authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance.



  - In order to promote better Stakeholder Relationship the Institution has evolved an effective mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances.
  - At the students' level, both the Mentors and the Counselors analyse the grievances/complaints and report to higher bodies for corrective action.
  - Grievance Redressal Cell of the College discusses the matter in detail and takes appropriate decisions.
  - At the Staff Level, both the Teaching and Administrative Staff Associations analyse the grievances and bring them to the attention of people concerned to bring about better interpersonal relationships.

- The Institution encourages the Faculty in Training and Retraining Requirements for their Professional Development to enable them to perform their roles and functions effectively
- In addition to this, the IQAC organizes In-house Training Programmes too.
- Skill Up-gradation Programmes are conducted regularly, especially when new Programmes/ courses/ teaching technologies are introduced:
  - A Seminar on *Grading at the Undergraduate Level* was organized for all the Teachers, Administrative Staff and Select Group of Student Representatives on 8 August, 2008. Prof Thomas Joseph, Member Secretary of the Kerala Higher Education Council led the sessions. Ms Geetha Antony Pullen, Lectured on the *Praxis of Grading*.
  - When *Informatics* was introduced as a Compulsory Paper for all the Courses, the College conducted a Three Day Training Programme for the Faculty from 28 to 30 October, 2010. Teachers were trained to use the smart boards efficiently, when the College set up ICT enabled classrooms.

- The institution has a policy of *Reward and Recognition* for faculty achievements.
- Regular interventions by the Top-Management to motivate the faculty.
- The administration allows Duty Leave for attending inter-institutional seminars and workshops.

## 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- The institution has the practice of Self Appraisal and Student Appraisal System of the faculty semester wise. Of late, we have introduced both the Peer and Head Appraisal too.

#### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

- The financial resources of the Institution are: funds from the University Grants Commission, Govt of Kerala and the College Management.
- *Students' Welfare Fund* collected at the time of first year admission is the fund available at the disposal of the Principal and are being utilized to meet the expenditure incurred for the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the students.
- Fee collected from the students of the self financing Programmes is another source of income to the College. Major portion of this is being used to pay the salary of the Guest Faculty. A portion of the income is being utilized for the maintenance of the infrastructure facilities for teaching-learning

The College has a time tested mechanism for the effective and efficient use of financial resources

- <u>UGC Funds</u>:
  - In order to co-ordinate the preparation of UGC Project Proposals and monitor the proper utilization of funds in the stipulated time schedule, one senior faculty has been entrusted by the College Council as the UGC Project Co-ordinator. Dr Maria Martin Joseph, Head, Department of Physical Education has been the Co-ordinator of UGC Projects during the XI Plan period.
  - The Infrastructure Development Committee, in consultation with the IQAC, monitors the proper utilization of UGC funds allocated for the development of infrastructure in the College.
  - IQAC plays a pivotal role in assuring quality in every activity of the College, including the proper and efficient use of financial resources.
- <u>State Govt Funds</u>:
  - The Major fund allocation from the State Govt includes Staff Salary and Student Welfare Funds.
  - The Administrative Team under the leadership of the Principal, Office Superintendant and the Head Accountant monitors the efficient use of State Govt funds.
- Management Fund:
  - The College Management is keen on the implementation and time bound completion of every project in the College. Every year the Management sets apart certain amount of money to be released as advance and partial financial support for the completion of every project funded by Govt Level Agencies.

The Management, the Catholic Diocese of Mananthavady has an efficient system of Financial Management. Bursar (the finance officer appointed by the Management) closely monitors the proper utilization of the fund. Whenever there is a genuine demand for financial requirement, the bursar, in consultation with the Manager takes initiative to make the fund available from the Management.

#### 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

- Internal Auditing:
  - Made by the Head Accountant and the Superintendant. The reports are regularly monitored by the Principal.
  - The College Management audit is conducted every year by a Chartered Accountant and the Income & Expenditure Statement is prepared.
- External Auditing:
  - Being a Govt. aided Institution, the College is subjected to external auditing made by the State Govt. at three levels:
    - University Level Auditing: The Finance Branch of Kannur University conducts financial auditing.
    - Departmental Audit: Officials from the office of the Deputy Director of Collegiate Education conduct Departmental auditing. The last Departmental audit was made in the year 2006 and no major objections were raised. A few minor objections had been raised and clarifications for the same have been given.
    - Accountant General's (Govt of Kerala) Auditing: The Officials of the AG's Office conduct the auditing
  - Auditing of the fund allocated to individual faculty to carry out research projects is done by qualified Charted Accountants and the reports of the same are submitted to the College Office.

### 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

- The Institution tries to procure the maximum possible financial support from the funding agencies whenever there is a chance to get the same. In spite of the Kannur University short listing us, the Institution narrowly missed the chance of getting the CPE status, which would have brought an additional fund of Rs 1 Crore as the State Quota was already exhausted.
- The Co-ordinator of the UGC Projects is vigilant on the release of new notifications about financial support from the UGC.

• IQAC plays a pivotal role in the fund mobilization for the College Development.

  - The primary objective of the IQAC is to develop/ensure a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution.
  - The IQAC, right from its inception, has been taking initiatives in looking after the welfare of all the stakeholders of the College and ensuring sustenance and enhancement of quality in academic/administrative/co-curricular/extra-curricular activities of the Institution.
- b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the Management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

In consultation with the Board of Governors, IQAC prepares Academic and infrastructure Master Plan and places them before the respective committees (College Council and Infrastructure Development Committee) for discussion and recommendation for implementation.

- Almost all decisions of the IQAC have been accepted for implementation
- On priority basis, almost all decisions have been actually implemented.

### c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

- Dr M P Sebastian, Head, Department of Computer Science of NIT Kozhikode and Dr Maani Attel, the Principal, Nirmalagiri College had been Senior Administrative Officers of the IQAC as outside experts.
- IQAC has two or three outside members of the locality, especially members or office bearers of the Local Self Govt Bodies (Panchayaths).
- Apart from this the PTA Vice president, who represent parents is an external member of IQAC
- Outside experts made immense contributions in introducing ICT enabled teaching learning process and in preparing the academic and infrastructure Master Plans.
- The local members and the PTA Vice President, who are familiar with the socio-economic status of the students, contribute in planning and in setting the quality benchmarks in the student oriented Programmes.

### d. *How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?*

- The Chairman and the Vice Chairperson (reserved for girl students) of the Students' Union are members of IQAC.
- IQAC collects feedbacks from the students which are then analyzed and utilized for the modification/renewal of annual plans.
- Feedbacks collected from the alumni through informal interactions are also utilized for the development of the College.


### e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

Using the outcomes of external auditing the following improvements have been made in the Institution:

- An IQAC has been set up in the Institution to develop/ensure a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution.
- The IQAC, right from its inception, has been taking initiatives in looking after the welfare of all the stakeholders of the College and ensuring sustenance and enhancement of quality in academic/administrative/co-curricular/extracurricular activities of the Institution.
- It has been generating ideas, establishing good practices, implementing & measuring the outcome of academic and administrative performances of the institution.
- It has been developing and applying quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic and administrative activities of the institution.
- It has been motivating the academic community in organizing workshops, seminars on quality related themes either directly or in association with other agencies on (various clubs and organizations) and off the campus (NGOs or GOs).
- All the Programmes in the College are being documented properly
- The Institution has been preparing the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) based on the quality parameters and submitting them to NAAC.

Schedules for teaching, conduct of examinations, conduct of Seminars, Workshops and other curricular & co-curricular activities of the year are critically evaluated and each faculty presents before the community their suggestions for the betterment and plans for major academic Programmes for the next year.

  - Green Audit mainly involves a walk-through inspection of the campus and identification of areas that could be greened and made more ecologically efficient

      - Screening of documentary films on energy conservation
      - > Organizing Seminars/Workshops on Environmental Issues

- Solar Garden Lamps are installed on the Campus replacing the conventional bulbs. Solar Water Heating System is installed to provide hot water to the Women's Hostel and Canteen.
- Energy Auditing of the Institution has been conducted by IQAC in association with the students of the Department of Zoology.
- The conventional Tungsten Bulbs are completely replaced with CFL bulbs in the Campus.
- We have made it a practice of switching off/unplugging fans, lights, computers, printers, electrical and electronic equipments etc. when not in use.
- The College watchmen regularly monitor and ensure the above.

#### • Use of renewable energy

- The organic waste materials generated in the College are efficiently being converted into bio-gas, and thereby a strong message of the significance of renewable energy is disseminated among the students.
- The energy demand of the College Canteen is partially met from the biogas plant.
- The major problem of Solid Waste Management is also tackled through this practice.
- Plastic wastes, if any, are effectively disposed off.

### • Water harvesting

- The Rainwater Harvesting Unit has been installed in the newly constructed buildings.
- Institution is planning to extend the Rainwater Harvesting System in the other buildings too.

### • Check dam construction

- Taking the conservation of water a serious concern, the Institution constructed a 20 x 15 x 4 metres pond in the Campus to recharge groundwater and to meet the diverse water demands of the Institution.
- A number of trenches (3x1x1 mts) are constructed in the campus for groundwater recharge.

### • Efforts for Carbon neutrality

- The Institution is well aware of its civic responsibility in maintaining the Carbon Neutrality in the Campus and in providing a pollution-free environment for its inmates.
- Carbon emission in the campus is negligible since the Campus is situated very close to Wayanad Wildlife Sanctuary.

- The Institution is situated in a lush green campus at an altitude of about 2000 feet above sea level. The well ventilated rooms in the College do not need fans or air conditioners.
- It is the policy of the Institution to minimize the number of air conditioners in the campus buildings and to limit the availability of refrigerators to the Science labs.
- <u>Carbon Dioxide</u> released into the atmosphere from burning <u>fossil fuels</u> in the campus has been partially compensated with <u>renewable</u> <u>energy</u> that creates a similar amount of *useful energy*. The Institution has a plan to use only renewable energies that do not produce any carbon dioxide (a post-carbon economy).
- <u>Carbon offsetting</u> is another practice in the Campus by <u>planting</u> <u>trees</u> to prevent future greenhouse gas emissions and to attain *net zero carbon footprint* or *carbon neutrality*.
- Plantation
  - The College has a Green Campus
  - The Bhoomitrasena in association with the Save Green Club of the College maintains a Primary Healthcare Garden to maintain medicinal herbs and trees. Name board on each plant carries its local and scientific names.
  - Tea plantation in the Campus increases its beauty.
  - Tree plantation and their conservation is a regular practice in the campus. The save Green Club, Bhoomitrasena and NSS take the responsibility of plantation.
  - The Biodiversity Register of the campus has been prepared by the volunteers of Bhoomitrasena Club.
  - The complete list of fauna and flora is displayed in the Campus

### Hazardous waste management

- Hazardous Wastes generated in the Science Labs of the College are negligible.
- The wastes generated are incinerated in the Campus itself.
- The students in the science departments are instructed to use only minimum required quantity of chemicals for their experiments so as to reduce the quantity of hazardous wastes being generated.

### • e-waste management

• Since the mechanism of maintenance and upkeep of electronic equipment in the Institution is efficient, the quantity of electronic waste generated is minimal.

- The electronic waste in the College includes irreparably damaged computers and their accessories, electronic/electrical equipment in laboratories etc.
- Computer wastes in the College are never landfilled in order to prevent them from polluting the groundwater.
- E-wastes in the College are usually sent to recyclers.

# **Best Practice-I**

- 1. Title of the Practice "Implementation of the Parliamentary Mode of Students' Union Election incorporating the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendation"
- 2. Goal
  - To implement the Parliamentary Mode of Students' Union Election following the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendation at the behest of the Honourable Supreme Court to ensure peaceful teaching-learning on the campus.
  - This has been practiced in the College since 2007 as a regulatory measure to ensure educational standards and to maintain excellence in education by replacing the older Presidential Mode of Students' Union Election
  - It also aims at maintaining discipline in the Institution by strengthening the head of the institution with sufficient powers so that students, who are keen to study and to improve their career are not be made victims of the anti-social activities a handful of students, whose dominant interest is indulging in party politics.

# 3. The Context

- Several instances of election related violence and other malpractices have been observed during the conduct of elections on college campuses in Kerala.
- Several instances of violence against college teachers and students by union activists, as well as of armed violence between union members and the police have been reported from Kerala.
- Before implementing the Parliamentary mode of election, this College experienced election related violence between two groups of students.
- It is a fact that a substantial portion of the academic year in most colleges gets exhausted in conducting elections and other union activities, leaving very little time for academic activities.

- After having discussions and negotiations at various levels, the College Council took a strong decision to implement the Parliamentary Mode of Election on the campus, taking the students into confidence and following the Lyngdoh Committee recommendations.
- It has also been decided to set up a special Grievance Redressal Cell with senior faculty as members to address election related grievances on disputes regarding the fairness, eligibility of the candidate and/or the non-observance of norms while holding the elections, etc.

### 4. The Practice

- To ensure peaceful teaching-learning environment on the campus a democratic system of electing Students' Union has been prevailing in the College since 2007 following the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendations.
- A male and female representative (Class Reps) each are elected from every class. The Chairman, General Secretary, University Union Councilor, Secretary to the Fine Arts Association, Student Editor to the College Magazine, General Captain to the Sports and Games activities, Secretaries to the Department Associations and Representatives of 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> year students are elected through Parliamentary Mode of Election. Two Seats, the Vice Chairperson and the Joint Secretary are reserved for girl students. It is to be highlighted that more than 50% of the candidates for the above major posts are girl students.
- The Class Representatives elected through this system function as a link between the College Union and individual Classes. Therefore, the decisions taken at higher levels are immediately conveyed to the entire students.
- In this system, the Class Reps play significant role in the effective day to day functioning of the College as custodians of Class Diaries, distribution of English Newspapers to their respective classes, etc.
- The policy of the institution is to promote co- and extra-curricular activities with equal importance to that of curricular activities and accordingly the College organizes various Programmes such as sports, games, quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc. regularly. Through the parliamentary mode of election the institution ensures peaceful, party-politics free campus, and organizes co- and extra-curricular activities with the full co-operation of all students.

- The Institution entrusts the responsibility of the Students' Union Advisor to a Senior Faculty as in the older system. However, in the present system, the Advisor has more responsibilities. The Union Advisor serves as the Mentor of the Union office bearers and the Co-ordinator of the Union activities.
- In order to put the policy of the College on co-curricular and extracurricular activities into practice, in a time bound manner, the College entrusts the responsibility with the Physical Education Director, Teachercoordinators of the Debate, Quiz, Fine Arts Clubs and other Clubs & Organizations. It is the policy of the institution to bring *Personalities of Eminence* in various fields to inaugurate the fine arts/sports activities in the College.
- Apart from the leadership role of the Chairman, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Joint Secretary and Association Secretaries, the following portfolios are allocated in the College Students' Union to ensure student participation in all areas of student activities:
  - Secretary to the Fine Arts Association: Responsible for promoting the artistic talents of the students, organizing fine arts activities on the campus and ensuring the participation of the students in intercollegiate competitions.
  - General Captain for Sports and Games: Responsible for promoting the sports talents, organizing sports and games activities on the campus and ensuring the participation of the students in intercollegiate sports & games competitions.
  - Magazine Editor: Responsible to compile the creative ideas of the College Community and publish the same in the form of a College Magazine. The Staff Editor and the Editorial Team support the Magazine Editor in publishing the College Magazine.
  - University Union Councilor (UUC): Represents the College in the University Union and serves as a link between the College Students' Union and the University Union.


### 5. Evidence of Success

• This is the only aided College affiliated to Kannur University and one among the very few aided colleges in Kerala State that successfully implemented the Parliamentary Mode of Students' Union Election. It has been proved that this mode of election ensures a party-politics-free, violence-free Campus where academic, co- and extra-curricular activities can be planned and implemented/organized in a peaceful atmosphere and that too under the leadership of elected Student Union office bearers.

- The prevalence of Parliamentary Mode of Students' Union Election has been appreciated by the public in general and the parents in particular which is reflected in the enhanced rate of *applications for admission* received in the recent years.
- This Practice has become an accepted system in the College and the students who resisted in the initial stage realized the merits of the system and extended their co-operation in the succeeding years.
- As a recognition for the efforts in implementing the system, the academic community of the State, recently honoured the Principal of the College, Dr Raju George with the *Award of the Best College Principal in Kerala,* instituted by Dr Tharsis Joseph (NAAC Peer Team Member and former Secretary of the State Principals' Council) Foundation based on the initiatives taken to implement the Lyngdoh Commission Recommendations as per the Hon. Supreme Court directives to ensure peaceful teaching learning by maintaining the campus violence-free from the evil effects of party politics.

#### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

### **Problems Encountered :**



- The candidates contesting the elections should possess certain minimum level of discipline and academic ability.
- No political activity to be allowed on the campus. Demonstrations, campaigning, and rioting in the classroom etc. will not be allowed. No meeting to be held in the campus without the permission of the Principal. Banners, posters, flags etc. of political organizations are not be allowed on campus as well as on the gates and compound walls of the campus.
- No outsider to be invited into the college by any group of students without the consent of the Principal.

## **Resource Required:**

- In order to set a platform for the smooth implementation of the new system discussions/meetings/negotiations at various levels have been convened; sought the support of parents, general public and mass media.
- Open forums to discuss and familiarize the Lyngdoh Commission Report have been organized in the College for students, parents, etc.

# **Best Practice-II**

#### 1. **Title of the Practice** 'PEN-R' – Project on English Newspaper Reading

- 2. Goal
  - To inculcate reading habit among the entire students of the college.
  - Subscription to more than hundred English newspapers for the students aims at improving their reading skills, developing confidence in English communication, improving their general awareness, broadening their vision, improving their vocabulary, inspiring their thoughts and helping them to absorb all kinds of information.
  - Though the primary objective of subscribing the 'Business Line' is to develop business orientation among the Commerce students, it helps them to improve their English language skills.

# 3. The Context

- Majority of the students hailing from poor rural background and first generation learners of this Institution are the products of Malayalam Medium Schools.
- Eventhough they are better in their major subjects, their Communication Skill (both oral as well as written) in English Language is poor.
- The Institution realizes that English communication skills are essential for the overall development of students. The confidence level of students can also be improved by acquiring competency in English Language.
- This was the driving force in introducing the practice of subscribing English National Dailies, <u>The New Indian Express</u> and <u>The Hindu</u> for each batch of UG students of the College.
- The recommendations of the NAAC Peer team in 2005 to give maximum emphasis on developing the communication skills of students have been considered very seriously. This project is an effort to materialize the same.

# 4. The Practice

- The Institution started subscribing two copies of The New Indian Express to each class on an experimental basis in 2006 and the result obtained was amazing.
- This was literally the driving force to think of making English newspapers available to each student in their class room, free of cost.
- The number of newspapers available to the students has been raised to three in the next year. The development in the reading habit of students was discernible.
- In the next year, the Institution has contacted the authorities of The New Indian Express and The Hindu to provide newspaper at reduced rate.
- The New Indian Express has agreed to reduce the rate to Rs. Two per copy, provided the College should subscribe a minimum of fifty copies.
- When the Student Edition of the New Indian Express was launched in 2011, the regular newspaper being supplied to the students was replaced with this.

- The Hindu daily has also agreed to supply the newspapers on a subsidized rate.
- Since the Peer Group Learning is an accepted practice in the College, the Slow Learners and the Advanced Learners sit together to read newspapers to engage in news analysis etc.
- The Media Club of the Institution conducts news reading contest and Newspaper Quiz for the students every year.
- In order to put the objectives of the Project into practice, the Institution gives the following directions to the students:
  - Try to read at least one small article twice a day.
  - Do not try to read much, but try to make it a habit to read something every day.

LA

- Try to read without a dictionary and guess the meaning of the whole article, even if you do not understand some parts.
- Choose articles that the student is interested in reading.
- Read the same type of article every day at the beginning and gradually increase the amount that he/she reads.
- After he/she can read that type of article well enough, try different types.
- Try to memorize words or phrases, which appear many times.
- The Dept of English has been conducting a Certificate Course in Communicative English with UGC assistance since the academic year 2007-08. The Department has been organizing various Programmes and activities to help the students overcome difficulties with regard to the usage of English. All such efforts taken by the Department of English supplement, to a great extent, to make the project a success.
- 5. Evidence of Success
  - Visible attitudinal change in the reading habits among the students
  - Better results in the University examinations in the Common Course in English
  - Improvement in the Presentation of Seminars by the students
  - Improved classroom performance of students
  - Active participation of students in participatory learning

- Results of Campus Interviews for Placement in the recent years.
- Increased number of readers of English magazines and subscribers of English books from the Central Library.

## 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Problems Encountered:

- Majority of the newly admitted students do not have the habit of reading newspapers, even in their mother tongue, regularly.
- To bring back the students to the print media was a challenging task in the initial stage as their access to the mass media was limited to Television.
- Since the competency in English language is limited, the level of confidence of the students, especially the Poor Learners, was very low.

# **Resources Required:**

- In order to materialize the objectives of the project, discussions/meetings at various levels have been conducted/convened.
- The possibilities of the Mentoring System have been utilized to the maximum extent to get the project materialized.
- Open forums to discuss the significance of acquiring competency in the Global language have been organized.
- The availability of the English National Dailies at concessional/cheaper • rates has been explored.




